The Hermiston Rod & Gun club is sponsoring a wild game feeding campaign on the project since the cold weather started. Saturday W. L. Hamm and other local citizens fed the ducks on the reservoir and river and on the meadows near the John Lewis farm. If it continues cold, feed will be placed for Chinese pheasants and other wild game birds.

REGISTRATIONS OF TOURISTS INCREASED

Secretary of State Earl Snell announced today that the increase in tourist registrations in 1936 exceeded the previous year by 40 per cent. This is an even greater pick-up in registrations than anticipated earlier in the year.

More than 140,000 motor vehicles from other states entered Oregon during 1936, which was a substantial gain over the registration of 100,300 cars in the preceding year. Final 1936 tabulations are still being received from registrars through out the state, but an increase of at least 40,000 non-resident cars is indicated in present reports.

The month of December alone brought an increase of approximately 1800 registrations, with the total reaching 5,200.

HEALTH OFFICER ISSUES WARNING

Dr. F. B. Belt, city health officer, in a statement Tuesday, urged citizens to avoid any unnecessary exposure, fatigue, and crowds during the continuance of the cold weather and the flu epidemic which seems to be getting underway here this week. The flu is of no more particular severity than in former years but can be lessened if proper precautions are taken.

Earl Smelcer, driver of the Westland district school bus, was quarantined Tuesday with scarlet fever and all students on the bus are required to remain at home for two weeks as a precaution against a spread in the disease. The bus has been fumigated and is ready for use again.

The Little Congress is composed of secretaries, clerks, and stenographers who meet weekly on Capitol Hill to discuss, in typical parliamentary fashion, the main issues before Congress.

Mr. Ashworth, a native Oregonian, was campaign secretary for Congressman Pierce this last fall. He is the first Little Congress Speaker from the Pacific Northwest.
