GO, DO LIKEWISE.

Do you as an individual like to have radio interference cut in on a program in which you are intensely interested? If you do, you don't know your radio.

The individual buys a radio in the interest of entertainment and education for himself and his family. He has it installed and finds that perfect reception is interrupted in the middle of an interesting program by buzzing equal to an electric saw blade in action. One cannot blame him for being exasperated. However, this interference may be caused by electrical appliances in his own household, which should be checked for static caused by defective wiring or parts.

Radio reception interference is not the other fellow's business only, but comes home to every individual whether a radio owner or not.

If you, as a citizen, would do your part in cooperating in the campaign to eliminate radio interference in Hermiston, you will call the Hermiston Light & Power company and ask them to use their equipment in locating any trouble which may be causing static. This courtesy service will be given by the company at the earliest possible moment with no cost to you.

No citizen can complain of man-made static on the radio until his

or her own electrical appliances have been tested for faults. After your own are taken care of, maybe you can encourage your neighbor to "go, and do likewise."
