CREAMERY MAN DIES AT SALEM

Funeral services for Thaddeus Stevens Townsend, 85, pioneer creamery man who was in business here for 35 years, will be held at First Friends church, S. E. 35th avenue and Main street, at 2 p. m. Tuesday. He died at Salem Saturday.

He was a member of the old Commercial club here and at Hermiston where he was in business for four years after leaving this city. In 1925 Mr. Townsend was awarded the gold medal of the National Creamery Butter Makers association, which was in session here, in appreciation of his pioneer creamery work in this state.

After he retired from business he and Mrs. Townsend moved to Yamhill county. Born in Monrovia, Ind., April 18, 1851, he married Mary E. Hadley of Mooresville, Ind., in 1873. They organized a church at Stewart, Iowa, and on coming to Oregon continued their religious activities. He, his wife and a brother organized and were charter members of what now is First Friends church here.

Five children survive: Corwin Townsend, Los Angeles; Leland Townsend, Oakland; Ethel Ball, Vesta Williams and Ione Townsend. -Journal.

COW TESTING INCREASES

Approximately 500 Oregon dairymen milking about 12,000 cows are now members of dairy herd improvement associations in Oregon, reports Roger Morse, extension dairyman at O.S.C. These associations were started in this state 26 years ago when the first was organized in Tillamook county.

The value of testing is in making a permanent record of the production and feed costs of each cow in the herd so that "star boarders" can be culled out, better feeding and management practices adopted, and comparisons made between daughters and dams, says Morse. Permanent identification marks for grade cows are now being worked out.

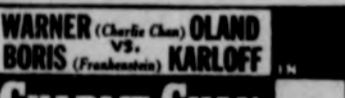
