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DIPHTHERIA CLINIC HERE SOON

Under the auspices of the Umatilla County Health association, a special service will be offered in the Umatilla, Hermiston and Columbia schools when a diphtheria immunization clinic will be conducted at the Umatilla school Friday, March 12, at 9:00 A. M., Columbia school Friday, March 12, 1:00 P. M., and the following week Friday, March 19, at 9:00 A. M. in the Hermiston school.

Leaflets explaining the disease and the necessity of immunization will be sent into each home from the schools. Accompanying the leaflet will be a slip requesting the signature of a parent if they wish their child protected against diphtheria. Parents wishing pre-school children to have this service may obtain additional slips at the school or from the county health nurse. The fee

for this service will be 40 cents per child.
Dr. F. B. Belt and the county health nurse will conduct the clinic assisted by members of the health association.
