**Train Young Drivers.**

A booklet issued by state officials in a statewide program of high school education in highway safety shows that 38,000 deaths resulted from motor vehicle accidents on the streets and highways of the United States during 1936, against 8,689 deaths resulted from 13 of the major catastrophes in the United States since 1871.

**Why prevent accidents?**

A study of these figures will help you to formulate your answer: 107 deaths, Chicago fire, October 9, 1871; 2,209 deaths, Johnstown (Pa.) flood, May 31, 1889; 575 deaths, Iroquois theatre fire, Chicago, December 30, 1903; 452 deaths, San Francisco earthquake and fire, April 18, 1906; 1,517 deaths, sinking of the Titanic, April 25, 1912; 1,198 deaths, sinking of the Lusitania, May 7, 1915; 606 deaths, Illinois tornado, March 18, 1925; 125 deaths, Cleveland clinic fire, May 15, 1929; 134 deaths, burning of the Moro Castle, September 8, 1934; 700 deaths, Florida hurricane, September 1-2, 1935; 200 deaths, (approximately), Ohio river valley and New England floods, March 1936; 466 deaths, tornado, Mississippi, Alabama and Georgia April, 1936; 400 deaths (approximately) Ohio river flood, January

**CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CHURCHES**  
 "UNREALITY" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, April 4.

The Golden Text was, "Surely God will not hear vanity, neither will the Almighty regard it" (Job. 35:13).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "And Jacob was left alone; and there wrestled a man with him until the breaking of the day. And when he saw that he prevailed not against him, he touched the hollow of his thigh; and the hollow of Jacob's thigh was out of joint, as he wrestled with him" (Gen. 32:24, 25).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "Jacob was alone, wrestling with error—struggling with a mortal sense of life, substance, and intelligence as existent in matter with its false pleasures and pains—when an angel, a message from Truth and Love, appeared to him and smote the snow, or strength, of his error, till he saw its unreality; and Truth, being thereby understood, gave him spiritual strength in this Peniel of divine Science. Then said the spiritual evangel: 'Let me go, for the day breaketh;' that is, the light of Truth and Love dawns upon thee. But the patriarch, perceiving his error and his need of help, did not loosen his hold upon this glorious light until his nature was transformed" (p. 308).
