To the above named defendant Jean Macdonald:

IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON,

You are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled court and cause within four weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons, and if you fail so to appear and answer, for want thereof plaintiff will apply to said court for a decree as prayed for and demanded in said complaint, to-wit:

A decree that plaintiff have and recover of and from the defendants Alonzo L. Needles and Katie Needles the sum of \$250.00, being the principal of two notes owned and held by plaintiff, with interest thereon at the rate of 6% per annum from the 3rd day of November, 1931, and the further sum of \$38.60, insurance premium paid by plaintiff, with interest thereon at the rate of 6% per annum from the 18th day of April, 1935, and the further sum of \$77.02, taxes paid by plaintiff, with interest thereon at the rate of 6% per annum from the 4th day of October, 1935, and the further sum of \$300.00 as an attorney's fee, and the costs and disbursements of this suit, and that said sums are a lien or liens against the following described land, to-wit:

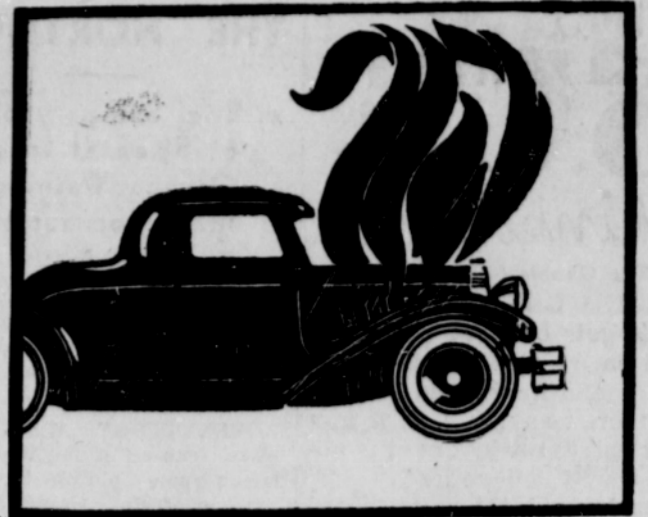

any one or more of said notes or having any interest therein, and that the court will enter herein such decree as may be proper for the protection of all parties concerned.

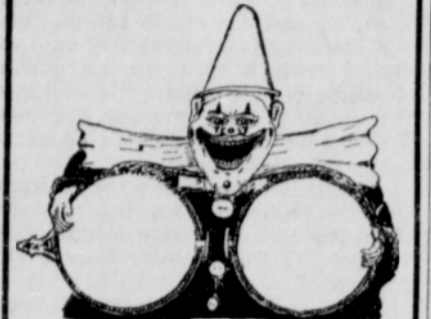
