Mildred Conlon returned to her home Saturday from Ashburg college in Kentucky, where she attended school.

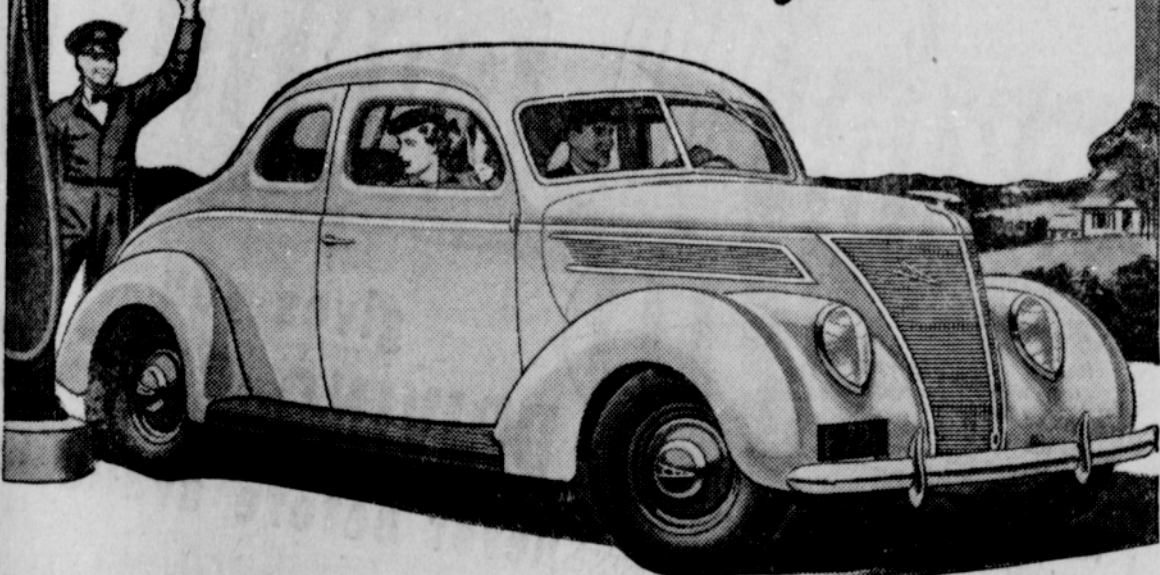
