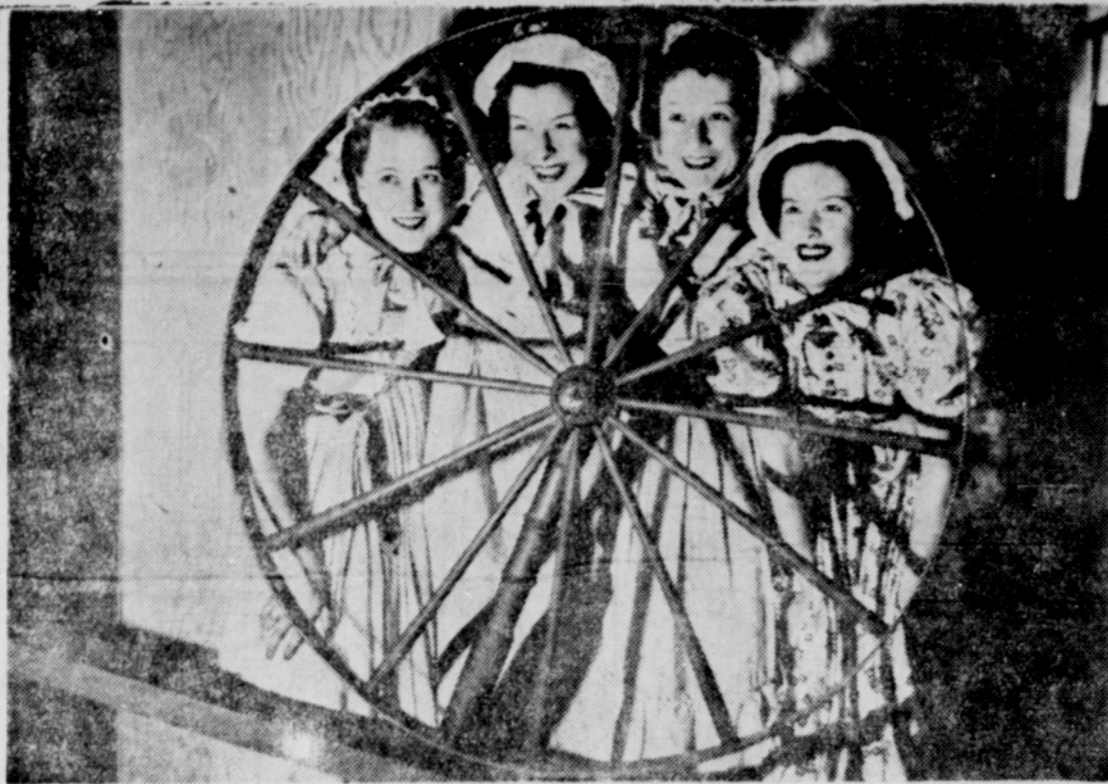

**The Diagonal Road.**

The Diagonal road was laid out and graded by the U. S. Reclamation Service in 1907, and the engines and steam shovel used in building Cold Springs dam were transported over the route by use of movable rails. It was first a pure sand road. Later rock and cement gravel was spread here and there in the worst places, and finally it was given a gravel bed to Pumpkin Center, later to Columbia school. Beyond the school the diagonal feature was not completed until after the Wallula

cut-off was built.
