## TWO NEW MEMBERS ADDED TO ASSN.

Bob Townsend, official tester for the Umatilla-Morrow Dairy Herd Improvement association, reports that two additional members were added to the association during the month, bringing the total members to thirty-five. 471 Cows are enrolled in the association of which 410 were tested during the month. The average production per cow was 632.4 pounds milk yielding 27.1 pounds butterfat. Three cows were weeded out as unprofitable during the month and three additional cows were purchased by members. One pure bred sire was purchased to replace a bull not suited for service.

High herd honors in the 12 to 20 cow class goes to C. A. Linder of Hermiston. His mixed herd of 15 Holsteins and Jerseys averaged 847.7 pounds milk and 35.4 pounds butterfat. High herd honors in the under 12 cow class goes to Chas. Seeliger of Hermiston. His herd of 11 Holstein cows averaged 826 pounds milk and 35.1 pounds butterfat. High herd honors in the over 20 cow class goes to C. A. Lynch of Hermiston. His herd of 43 registered Holsteins averaged 977.6 pounds milk and 31.4 pounds butterfat.

High herd honors for the seven months' testing in the 20 cow or more class goes to C. A. Lynch. His herd of 43 registered Holsteins has an average of 6055.1 pounds milk and 198.6 pounds butterfat. In the 12 to 20 cow class high honors goes to B. B. Eastridge of Pendleton. His mixed herd of 14 Holsteins and Guernseys averaged 4656.1 pounds milk and 192.7 pounds butterfat. In the under 12 cow class the eight registered Guernsey cows owned by W. P. Coppock of Adams averaged 4154.3 pounds milk and 198.8 pounds butterfat.

The high cow in the class "A" division, which includes cows 5 years or over, owned by H. G. Moore of Hermiston, is a 6-year-old registered Ayrshire. She produced 1305 pounds milk and 71.7 pounds butterfat. The high cow in total pounds of milk produced was owned by C. A. Lynch, a 6-year-old registered Holstein producing 1726 pounds milk and 69.7 pounds butterfat. The high cow in class "B", cows 4 years or over, was owned by Chas. Seeliger, a grade Jersey producing 1116 pounds milk and 53.5 pounds butterfat. In class "C", three year olds, the high cow was owned by Mrs. Edna Mulkins, a registered Guernsey producing 1224 pounds milk and 55.0 pounds butterfat. In class "D", two year olds, high cow was owned by Dell Christley, a registered Jersey producing 1280 pounds milk and 51.2 pounds butterfat.

## FIRST OIL CO-OP TEN YEARS OLD

America's first cooperative oil wholesale closed its tenth year of operation with a volume of business ten times that of its first year. E. G. Cort, manager, reported at the eleventh annual meeting of the Midland Cooperative Wholesale at Minneapolis, June 8. With 37 affiliated cooperatives in 1927, Midland's volume stood at \$269,000. Ten years later the co-op wholesale was serving 160 member associations and sales were \$3,033,000.

During the past year Midland established a branch warehouse and oil compounding plant at Milwaukee; added electrical appliances to the commodities handled; joined two other co-op wholesales to take the complete output of a large, modern oil refinery in Oklahoma; assisted the organization of two insurance cooperatives; added 19 retail co-ops to its membership and increased its volume of business 25-16 per cent over the previous year.

## DAIRY FIELD DAY SAT., AUGUST 14

An old fashioned basket dinner, free ice cream and coffee, picnic style, will be served in connection with the annual Dairy Field Day to be held at the Umatilla Field Station Saturday, August 14.

The morning will start promptly at ten o'clock with a tour of the station. Special emphasis will be given to experiments pertinent to the dairy industry. Experiments of special interest to dairymen are succulent winter crops, mixed grass, legume, and sweet clover pastures. Information will also be available on alfalfa experiments covering commercial and barnyard manure and variety tests. Additional field trips will be arranged for those interested in other phases of the station program.

In addition to the station tour, a dairy judging contest will be arranged for both 4-H club members and farmers. Roger Morse, extension dairyman, will outline the different points to consider in judging dairy cattle before the classes are judged. Particular stress will be given to classifying dairy cows for both type and production. Substantial prizes will be offered for the contest by the Farm Bureau Co-op and the Umatilla Co-operative Creamery.

A new contest featuring the identification of different grasses, legumes and the most important noxious weeds located on the projects will make up part of the morning program.

The dairy 4-H demonstration will be the construction of a safety keep bull pen showing how the shed, exercise and breeding chute is arranged.

The afternoon program will consist of educational talks by prominent men interested in the promotion of better dairy practices in the state of Oregon.

I. R. Jones of the Oregon experiment station, will give the results of experiments conducted at the Umatilla Field Station. The experiments cover a period of six years along dairy production lines.

G. A. Brown, manager of Interstate Associated Creameries, who is well known to local dairymen, will give the marketing program of the Interstate Creameries which handles the marketing of butter from a number of cooperative creameries in Oregon including the Umatilla Co-operative Creamery.

Roger Morse, extension dairyman at O.S.C., will outline a long-time dairy cattle breeding program for farmers in this area. His experience among Oregon dairymen gives him a wide knowledge of methods and conditions existing in different areas in the state.

In keeping with the quality milk and cream program for the state of Oregon, A. W. Metzger, assistant chief of foods and dairies of the State Department of Agriculture, will discuss the Oregon cream grading law which is in force in Oregon at the present time.

A. E. Benschel will have charge of the sports program.

## 4-H CLUB NEWS

There are over 22,803 young folks in Oregon organized "To make the best better the 4-H way." In the 36 counties of the state with a rural population of nearly 465,000.

Out of the total area of the state, 95,609 square miles, 25,860 square miles are devoted to farming. It compares in area with Kansas, and is the ninth ranking state in the Union, according to size.

There are 2,196 club members enrolled in the city of Portland. It is the only city in the United States to have club work organized under a special club agent, and he is employed full time.

The service of a club agent is in nine counties. In the other 24 the work is carried out by agricultural and home agents, or local interested persons.

The annual "demonstration tour" is an outstanding part of the girls program. Accompanied by assistant state club leader, Helen Cowgill, the members of the state winning team, go to interested counties and present their demonstration at gatherings of the 4-H leaders and members who profit by it for their future appearances.

Because of the high placings earned by many Oregon members, national 4-H circles have been "Oregon-concious" since the beginning of the national contests. Oregon has received the Moses

Leadership trophy four times out of the twelve years since it has been offered.

Using the \$300 scholarship she won in the 1936 food preparation, Marie Meyer has enrolled in college this fall. With the help of a \$100 scholarship from canning honors, Rosa Reichle, also of Portland, will continue her education. These girls were listed in the placings of clothing exhibitors and food judges at the last International Livestock show.

## 4-H CLUB MEMBER TO EXPOSITION

Hopeful of winning the trip to the Pacific International Livestock Exposition this fall sponsored by the First National Bank of Portland, 4-H club members in Umatilla county are completing special projects and preparing entries for county and 4-H fair competition. Choice of a boy and girl from every county in Oregon will be based on outstanding leadership and achievement in club work.

Success of the 1936 contest arranged by the First National Bank through its own branch units and county agents brought widening of the affair's scope to include all of Oregon this year, according to Walter H. Brown, assistant vice president of the bank in charge of the Pacific International visit. H. C. Seymour, Oregon 4-H club director, has again been appointed general chairman of the judging and awards.

Judges will be the county agent, county superintendent of schools and the First National Bank branch manager. In counties not served by the Portland bank's branch system, other local banks will cooperate in selecting a third member of the judging committee.

The three-day visit in Portland during the October livestock exposition will include daily trips to the show grounds and entertainment by the host bank, which will pay transportation and all other expenses of the 4-H club members.

## BRITISH CO-OP EDITOR TO SPEAK

New York—Sydney Elliott, editor of Reynolds News, London, and author of "The English Cooperatives" will speak to cooperative audiences in five cities during his brief visit in this country according to a schedule just released by The Cooperative League of the USA.

Mr. Elliott will arrive here July 26. Defering his New York addresses until his return from the west, he will speak first to the Cooperative Institute in session at Camp Newton Hamilton, near Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, August 2 to 4 under the auspices of the Pennsylvania Farm Bureau Cooperative Association. He will address groups in Washington, D. C., August 5-6; Columbus, Ohio, August 9-10; Chicago, August 12-13 and New York August 18-25.

## UMATILLA COUNTY BUYING POWER HIGH

Average buying power in Umatilla county is well above the national average, and Oregon is rated the third state in the country in average spendable income, according to the annual buying power survey just released by Oregon Mutual Life Insurance company.

Umatilla's buying power index stands at 118, healthily higher than the national average of 100. Retail trade in the county gained 61 per cent in the 1933-35 period. Passenger car registration in the county is 234 per 1000 people, much higher than the 182 registrations per 1000 recorded nationally.

Only Nevada, with an index of 168, and California, with 149, had a higher buying power rating than Oregon, with an index of 135.

The three Pacific Coast states, with an average buying power rating of 143, led all geographical subdivisions in the country by a wide margin, the middle Atlantic and east north central groups standing second with a 115 index figure.

The survey indicated that the average Pacific Coast family has spendable income three times as large as the average family in the deep south, and one-third higher than the national average.

Living standards are much higher in the far west, the survey indicates. All classifications studied by Oregon Mutual, from data prepared by Sales Management, show the Pacific Coast leads in retail sales increases, new car sales, passenger car registrations per 1000 population and stand second in the number of income tax returns filed in proportion to population.
