Race No. 6—Three-eighths mile. Free for all horses, including winners on previous day.

Trick riding, by Wilkin Williams of Pendleton, fancy roping, and some unusual jumping exhibitions by Miss Eva Wilcox with her horse "Frisky" will be given during the intermission between the above races.

There will also be, for the crowd's entertainment, a musical rope race, the old fashioned snipe race, and the cow pony stake race.

These events will all be interspersed during the intermission of the above races.

DANCE SATURDAY NIGHT

INTEREST SHOWN IN NEW RACE FEATURE

Interest is being shown in the horse race events for the fair on Friday and Saturday by many who have been on the grounds to try the track, and other inquiries and registrations. Those who have tried the track say that it is in fine shape for the races.

The Frank Swaggart string of near Lexington, well known in these parts, will be among the entries. A string of fast horses have been entered by an Indian from Pendleton. Milo McFarland of Umatilla has entered three horses. One entry has been made from the Umatilla ranch. Joe Hawkins and his daughter Jane will enter several good horses. Jane was trying the track early this week and finds it in excellent condition.

Ten head of horses are being offered by their owners in the nearby territory for the saddle horse races. Gabriel of Stanfield and Joe Hawkins of Adams will enter Shetland ponies and have them on the grounds for the entertainment of the little folk.

Wilkin Williams of Pendleton will give an exhibition in trick riding and fancy roping. Miss Eva Wilcox of Hermiston will exhibit her horse "Frisky" in fancy jumping.

The committee in charge of the race track construction is John Jendzjewski, E. D. Martin and Glenn Moore. Ample space for parking has been provided for witnessing the races from automobiles.

HOP PICKERS NUMBER NINETY

Hop picking started Monday of this week in the L. W. Dixon yard as some 50 pickers erected their camps on the grounds about the new hop kiln. Many tons of hops will be gleaned from the 18-acre yard which will be dried and baled in the new hop kiln and stored until marketed.

Mr. Dixon specializes in the late Cluster Seedless variety of hops, which are being grown singularly free from blight or other diseases. The seedless variety is comparatively new but is said to be of greater market value.

Hop picking has continued continuously during the working day since Monday with the weather favorable until Tuesday when a light rain fell. This did not prevent activity at the yard, however.

Dixon expects a good yield and at present the hopp market quotation is nominally at Portland at 8 to 12 cents a pound.

STATE GRANGE MASTER SPEAKS

One hundred and twenty-five people attended the Grange picnic held last Sunday at Columbia park, and heard an address by Ray W. Gill, Master of the Oregon State Grange. Mr. Gill spoke of the accomplishments of the State and National Granges, and talked about Bonneville legislation, in an address which was well received. Mr. Sanderson of Freewater, editor of the Cooperative News, spoke on cooperation, and introduced Dr. Pratt, a prominent cooperator of Walla Walla.

Brief words of welcome were spoken by Emory Cox, D. F. Deperman, and R. G. Penney, masters of the Columbia, Echo, and Stanfield Granges, respectively. Musical entertainment was furnished by the Sagebrush Wranglers of Stanfield, and by H. J. Ott and Jesse Prindle. Mrs. Philip Power gave a reading to complete the program of entertainment.

D. H. Sherwood, Master of the Westland Grange, acted as master of ceremonies for the entertainment program, and the athletic program, of softball and horseshoes, was arranged by W. E. Mulkins.

4-H CLUB MEMBERS PREPARE FOR FAIR

Club leaders and 4-H club members in the west end of Umatilla county have been busy the past two weeks preparing exhibits and demonstrations for the annual Umatilla Project fair.

Livestock clubs have been using the electric clippers owned by the fair board in preparing their animals for the show before Wednesday of this week. Other breeders will be using the clippers Thursday on entry day.

Jay T. Pierson, assistant county agent, states that there was a watchman at the grounds all night Wednesday so that it was not necessary for any club member to stay overnight to watch his calf. Hay and straw will be furnished by the fair board but clubbers are bringing extra grain. Each club member is bringing his own feed box, water trough, and bucket, in an effort to prevent possible spread of disease.

GEORGE HENRY MARTIN PASSES

George Henry Martin passed away Saturday, August 28th, at the home of his daughter Mrs. Bert Quick in Hermiston following an illness of more than a year. Funeral services were conducted Tuesday by Elder G. F. Watson of McMinnville in the Seventh Day Adventist church, and interment was in the Hermiston cemetery.

Mr. Martin was born in Middleton, Ohio, April 2, 1862. He married Miss Emma Parrot of Edgar county, Illinois, on May 4, 1884. In the fall of 1910 he moved with his family to Oregon, where he lived until his death.

PROGRAM PACKED WITH EVENTS

ARRANGEMENT OF PARADE OUTLINED

The program for the three day fair appearing on the opposite side of this page is complete. The three days of the fair are packed full of interesting events and activities at the fair grounds give evidence that things are being done to get the grounds in readiness for the annual show, which this year, is in celebration of the silver jubilee. The race track has been put in shape, the poultry coops are ready, hay and straw is available for stock, the old exhibit building has been floored and a fence has been placed about the track.

The parade at 10:00 o'clock Saturday morning will be led by a horseman carrying the American flag, followed by Queen Virginia and attendants, of the fair. Next will be all irrigation district floats. These will be followed by Queen Cathryn of the Pendleton Round-Up, and the CCC features and schools. Next in line will be the cooperative and farm floats, to be followed by the business floats. In the rear of these will be all livestock, followed by automobiles.

It is important that all floats and exhibitions in the parade arrive before 9:00 o'clock. Several riders will be on hand to direct the formation into various divisions.

Business floats on the road south of the Farm Bureau toward the Campbell place.

Farm Bureau, grange, farm and cooperative floats the street in front of the Farm Bureau mill and the grange store to Hermiston avenue and past the creamery.

Irrigation district floats near the Hermiston Irrigation district office, facing toward the state highway.

School busses and school children at the school grounds, and enter the parade at the Legion hall.

Pendleton Round Up queen and parade feature will form in position on streets south of the Irrigation district building and enter the parade at rear of irrigation district floats.

The CCC boys will be placed on the street leading south from Hermiston Transfer company and follow the round-up group.

All livestock will enter the parade at the fair grounds, taking position eastward to the Farm Bureau. Automobiles will be asked to follow from streets leading westward from the fair grounds.

When the formations are completed the parade will start with the American flag leading onto the state highway, then turn the corner at Walker's Service station to Main street. Thence along Main to the Hermiston Hotel, thence to Rohrman's and to the railroad crossing into Hermiston avenue and westward to the fair grounds.

Parade Prizes.

A premium of \$7.50 will be given for the most outstanding float appearing in the parade Saturday morning. \$5.00 for the second best and \$2.50 for third. Five dollars will be given the best individual farm display in the parade; \$2.50 for second and \$1 for third. No organization or business concern can compete for these prizes. First, second and third ribbons will be awarded for best float in each division.
