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A West End Fair

The recent success of the Umatilla project fair justifies enlargement of the local enterprise. For 25 years it has been carried on. This could not happen without justifiable results. The benefits have been many in the development of live-

stock and farming interests. The success and patronage of the silver jubilee event are ample proof that the name should be changed from Umatilla project fair to "The West End fair" or to Umatilla county fair. No other town in Umatilla county has such a set of buildings, nor such a race track. The equipment is here and roads are good, making distance figure little in the matter. With the aid of the county court and the assistance of members of the legislature, additional premium funds may be secured. Exhibitors of fruits from the east end, and grains and livestock from other districts may be transported at small cost, and competition in all products increased. Truck loads over the new cutoff highway are but a half mile from Pendleton and not over an hour and a half from any part of the county to the fair grounds and race track here. A fair board should be larger and members chosen from several districts. It is one of those things that can be done with sufficient prize and organization.

VISITOR'S DAY
AT SQUAW BUTTE

Oregon's largest and newest branch experiment station will hold its first field day when stockmen from Oregon and neighboring states gather at the 16,000 acre Squaw Butte range station in Harney county west of Burns.

While very little actual experimental work has yet been carried out, the division of grazing of the department of the interior and the O.S.C. experiment station, which cooperates in the management of the station, have arranged the field day to acquaint stockmen with the plans and purposes of the huge undertaking.

Arrangements are being made to entertain some 200 visitors Wednesday, September 15. The stockmen are being invited to arrive in time for a 12 o'clock dinner at the CCC camp, after which they will be shown the headquarters setup and then will be conducted on a tour over the seven major ranges, averaging more than 2100 acres each in extent, and the seven smaller ranges of from 40 to 160 acres each.
