## CO-OP WHOLESALE ANNIVERSARY

**SUPERIOR, WISC.** — Central Wholesale, organized as a little heralded note of peace in the summer of 1917 when the nations were immersed in the holocaust of the World War, will celebrate its twentieth year of operation September 5 when several thousand consumer-members of the pioneer co-op wholesale will gather in Superior for a cooperative rally.

Organized by representatives of 20 cooperatives at the head of the Great Lakes in July, 1917, C.C.W. is now serving more than 100 co-operative associations operating 145 cooperative stores in Minnesota, Wisconsin, and Northern Michigan. From a few hundred individual members those co-ops have grown to include in membership more than 33,000 consumers.

With \$15.50 capital in 1917, the co-op wholesale has built a business which totaled \$2,845,000 in 1936 and on the basis of its first six months volume will exceed \$3,500,000 in 1937.

C.C.W. had its first office in a corner of the office of the editor of a Finnish humor magazine. In 1918 the "Exchange", as it was then called, bought a three-story brick warehouse. By 1925 the volume had grown so large that the co-op moved into the largest, most modern warehouse building in Superior, held the old building as the office of a rural electric co-op and a year later opened a branch warehouse in Virginia, Minnesota, to serve its affiliated co-ops there.

Dr. John Barton of the University of Wisconsin, authority on international cooperation and the Danish co-ops, will be the main speaker at the celebration which will begin with folk dancing and social dancing at the Co-op Pavilion, Brule, Saturday night and an all day picnic and sports festival at Billings Park, Superior, September 5.

## 91 PEOPLE TOUR NOVA SCOTIA CO-OPS

**ANTIGONISH, Nova Scotia** — Members of the First Annual Tour of Nova Scotia Co-ops which ended with the Rural and Industrial Conference on the grounds of St. Francis Xavier University here August 21, voted to take steps to assure the success of a similar tour next year. Final registration for the tour included 91 persons from 18 states, the District of Columbia and 5 provinces of Canada who studied the educational program of St. Francis Xavier University and visited credit unions, study clubs, cooperative stores, lobster processing factories, fisheries and mills in Nova Scotia.

Rev. J. Henry Carpenter, director of the tour, reported that after all bills for the trip were paid there was a saving of more than \$400. The tour was operated on a cooperative basis and savings were to be returned to the members of the tour but they voted to waive their refunds. A gift of \$100 was voted to establish a traveling library for the people of Nova Scotia and the remaining \$300 voted to The Cooperative League as a special tour fund for the development of similar tours.

## DELEGATES VISIT BRITISH CO-OP

OXFORD, England.—The Universal Christian Conference, which drew together delegates from churches throughout the world for its deliberations here July 12 to 26, arranged a trip to the Oxford Cooperative Society, a typical British co-op, as a feature of its economics section. The party included over forty American churchmen and was led by Rev. Allan Chalmers of the Broadway Tabernacle, New York.

The churchmen went through the grocery, butcher shop, furnishings and other departments and then assembled in the Board Room where the general manager addressed them. Many questions were asked and answered about both the methods of operation and the social consequences of the cooperatives and the delegation came away much impressed with this concrete illustration of the British Cooperative Movement.

Arrangements for the co-op seminar were made by Dr. H. S. Leiper, Executive Secretary of the Department of Relations with Churches Abroad of the Federal Council of Churches.

## HEALTH CO-OP ATTACK

NEW YORK.—Doctors in Missouri, demanding not only the right to fix fees for service but also the right to say how and when that payment shall be made, are planning to launch an attack on cooperative medicine which is designed to destroy the Wage Earners Health Association in St. Louis, according to a statement issued today by the Bureau of Cooperative Medicine.

The Wage Earners Health Association was organized in April, 1936, and is providing medical service to its 300 family members for \$3 to \$5 per family per month. The physicians serving the members of the association and the service offered under the plan are above criticism. Dr. Kingsley Roberts, director of the Bureau of Cooperative Medicine, declared in exposing the attack, in spite of the fact that this plan makes it possible to provide adequate medical care to the people who need it, the St. Louis County Medical Association is threatening to bring legal action against the co-operative. The Journal of the American Medical Association for July declared, "It is hoped in Missouri to bring this matter to a test in the Supreme Court of Missouri in the very near future, to eradicate once and for all this problem which has been growing and eating at the vitals of the medical profession."

The question facing the people, declared Mr. Brown, secretary of the Bureau, is whether any group of medical men should be permitted to control not only the science of medicine, treatment and cure, but also the methods of payment upon which they will give such care. As Dr. W. T. Foster, director of the Pollack Foundation for Economic Research points out, "If by the 'right to control its own affairs' the organized profession means the right to decide how the consumers of medical service shall pay for those services, the profession is demanding the kind of control which is granted no other profession."

## EASTERN OREGON CCC TRANSFERRED

Transfer of eight Civilian Conservation Corps camps in eastern Oregon to the jurisdiction of the Lewiston CCC District, Lewiston, Idaho, was announced today by Capt. Joel D. Pomeroy, executive officer of the Vancouver Barracks CCC district, and acting district commander in the absence of Brigadier General George C. Marshall. The transfer is effective August 31.

The number of camps remaining in the Vancouver Barracks district will be reduced to 26 after the first of the month. On the transfer list are two Ninth Corps Area camps, Hillgard at LaGrande, Ore., and Baker at Baker, Ore. The others, composed of boys from other corps areas, are Stanfield, Squaw Creek at Gibbon, Heppner at Heppner, Canyon Creek at Bates, Coverdale at Enterprise, and Ukiah at Pendleton. Capt. B. A. Johnson, sub-district commander of eastern Oregon, is scheduled to remain on duty in this district, it was reported.

## PEA WEEVIL PROBLEM IS SOLVED BY SCIENTISTS

One of the most satisfactory solutions on record of a major crop pest control problem has been accomplished this year in working out methods of control of the pea weevil, most serious insect pest of garden and field peas.

Funds for an intensive study of this control problem were first supplied to the Oregon experiment station from private sources through the Agricultural Research Foundation and later were added to through a special appropriation of the Oregon legislature voted at the urgent request of growers and processors of Oregon's important pea industry.

Federal and state college entomologists, working on the problem last year in connection with the B. E. Maling, Inc., freezing and canning plant at Hillsboro, succeeded in getting reasonably satisfactory control for the first time through the use of rotenone dust, a relatively new insecticide made from roots of certain tropical plants.

Continuing the work early this spring, the Oregon research men prepared to supervise the dusting of nearly 1000 acres of western Oregon peas contracted to the Hillsboro canning and freezing plant. Almost 100 per cent control was obtained, where the dusting was carried out at the proper time. Infestation proved to be so heavy this year that special dusting equipment permitting the covering of large acreages quickly had to be developed in cooperation with the growers and equipment dealers.

As the huge acreage of canning peas in eastern Oregon neared maturity, it was found that an extremely heavy infestation of weevil was over running the border strips of early trap crops which had been depended upon to prevent serious infestation of the main crop. Immediately, entomologists of the experiment station, headed by Kenneth Gray, added the benefit of their western Oregon experience to the work of private and federal entomologists working in the eastern Oregon area.

As quick action was necessary, agricultural engineering specialists of the college were called upon to help adapt and build large scale dusting machines on the farms similar to those previously designed in western Oregon. By immediate use of these it was possible to get rotenone dust on practically all of the Oregon acreage infested by the weevil, with such perfect results that only a fractional percentage of the huge acreage was lost.

Much detailed work in timing, dosage and the like remains to be done, but all are agreed that the fundamental answer to the weevil problem has been found.

## Corn Considered as Major Crop.

HILLSBORO.—Field corn growing is being considered as a major grain crop for small farms in Washington county, and numerous trials are under way in which various strains of hybrid field corn from the middle west are being compared as to cost of production, yield and other factors with the locally grown corn, according to W. F. Cyrus, county agent. He points out that it has been recognized for some time that raising small grain crops is not a satisfactory enterprise for the smaller farms of the county because the return per acre has been inadequate to provide a sufficient income.

## Hogs Wary of Electric Wires.

LAKEVIEW.—A two wire electric hog fence, costing approximately \$15, keeps hogs out of a 3 1/2 acre field of mangels on the H. L. Price farm in the Idaho district of Lake county. The electricity can be turned off for as much as two weeks and the hogs still refuse to go near the fence, Mr. Price says.

## New Seed Cleaner Installed.

DALLAS.—A. F. Elkins & Sons have installed one of the new type vetch seed cleaners which they invented last year on their farm on the Luckiamute river south of Monmouth, and plan to clean all their own seed as well as do custom cleaning. The machine is said to be exceptionally efficient. In one test in which vetch seed was cleaned, the seed as it came out of the cleaner showed a purity of 99.6 per cent.
