ALBANY — The effectiveness of the paradichlorobenzene treatment for peach and prune root borers has

been demonstrated in the Paul Rolf prune orchard near Lebanon. Last year these trees showed an average of two or three root borers each

tree when inspected by Mr. Rolf and County Agent F. C. Mullen. The "paradi" treatment was given, and this year Mr. Rolf and Mr. Mullen were able to find only one borer to 25 or 30 trees.
