**TRAFFIC SAFETY MAKES ADVANCE**

Traffic safety made greater advances in this state last month, in comparison with last year's record, than during any other month this year, Secretary of State Earl Snell announced today.

Highway travel, measured by gasoline sales, increased six per cent over last October, but accidents increased only 4.3 per cent, while injuries fell off 1.5 per cent and fatalities dropped 17.4 per cent.

Especially noteworthy is the proportion of traffic deaths to gasoline consumed. Last year the rate was 20.3 deaths for every 10 million gallons of gasoline sold, while during the first 10 months this year the

rate fell to 17.1 deaths per 10 million gallons, Snell said.
