BULLDOG DEFENSIVE PLAY OUTSTANDING

The H. H. S. boys' and girls' hoop squads made it two in a row Saturday, December 4, at Umatilla, when they defeated both their teams to the tune of 46 to 17 for the girls and 18 to 12 for the boys.

The girls got off to a good start and scored 16 points in the first quarter to Umatilla's nothing. The second quarter told a little different story because Umatilla girls began to work harder, but failed to keep up with the Hermiston basketweavers and the half ended 24 to 12. The

last half progressed in just about the same fashion as the first, and the game ended 46 to 17. Again Margie Estle was high point girl for Hermiston, having scored 22 points and Patsy Cooney for Umatilla with 10 points.

The Bulldog-Viking game was very fast and close checked, with shots very few and far between, and connections fewer and farther. The game was so fast that fouls were frequent, but no one went out of the game.

Knapp started the fireworks with a basket from mid floor immediately after the tip-off. The remainder

of the first half was fast and furious, and ended 12 to 4 in favor of Hermiston.

The defense tightened up in the second half and Umatilla started hitting long ones. The Bulldogs failed to score in the third quarter and the Vikings gained 10 points, but the Bulldogs were still two in the lead. The Hermiston quint renewed her fight and dropped three fast shots in the last few minutes to cinch the game which ended 18 to 12.

Both teams fought hard and no one knew from one minute to the next which team would put on a rally and proceed to mop up the gym with the other.
