**CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CHURCHES**  
 "MORTALS and Immortals" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, Nov. 14.

The Golden Text was, "Because ye are sons, God hath sent forth the Spirit of his Son into your hearts, crying, Abba, Father. Wherefore thou art no more a servant, but a son; and if a son, then an heir of God through Christ" (Gal. 4:6, 7).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "Thus saith the Lord; Cursed be the man that trusteth in man, and maketh flesh his arm, and whose heart departeth from the Lord. Blessed is the man that trusteth in the Lord, and whose hope the Lord is" (Jer. 17:5, 7).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "Mortals are the counterfeit of immortals. They are the children of the wicked one, or the one evil, which declares that man begins in dust or as a material embryo. 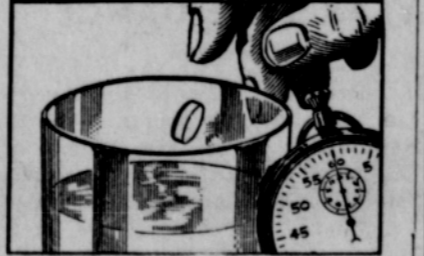
