More dependence on scientific facts and a determination to approach Oregon's fish and game problem from the standpoint of cooperative discussions among all concerned, characterized both the discussions and the final action taken by the Oregon Wild Life federation at its second annual conference just held at Oregon State college at the call of Gov. Charles H. Martin.

This attitude was exemplified by representatives of the game commission in outlining plans for the coming year, by those who discussed the

inter-related problem of game conservation and livestock production, and by those who are seeking to avoid the continued pollution of Oregon's streams from city and industrial plant wastes.

In the last-named instance, the federation voted unanimously to back a proposed initiative measure which, if enacted, will create a state sanitary authority, which in turn will appoint a sanitary engineer. The bill would give the sanitary board power to prevent future stream pollution and gradually bring about correction of present undesirable situations, but without attempting to force an immediate complete cleanup, which has proved impossible in the past.

The responsibility of game conservationists to consider the rights of farmers in any work undertaken was brought out a number of times during the meeting, once when it was stated that additional efforts should be made to see that farmers on whose place upland birds and similar game gain their support throughout the year should receive some compensation when these are killed during the open season. The

interrelated situation of deer and livestock in eastern Oregon was discussed and a resolution pledged the federation to take every effort towards solving the problem on the basis of facts and round-table discussions among all those concerned.

Other resolutions opposed "big buck" and "big fish" contests, except in the case of salmon, urged strict regulation of mineral dredging operations, and created a committee to study and report on game and fish law enforcement.
