SAVORY BITS FOR CAROLERS

"It came upon the midnight clear," may well be the echo of a truly mysterious holiday night. A night that lends itself with beauty and awe to reverberations of songs of lusty carolers as they walk or drive, but who give music to the air, the night before Christmas.

Caroling is a custom that has survived the ages. It speaks a language that can be transmitted through no other means. It inspires and gives confidence to its rapt listeners, and an exuberant inward joy to those, who, because of their love of song, participate.

The song may go on . . . from early evening, to midnight and day-break, but it is most popularly created when pleasantries of fireside cheer and food break the hour. This unanimous feeling gives golden opportunity to those interested in contributing toward the entire spirit, but who cannot sing, to have preparations in hand for serving the midnight snack or the daybreak breakfast. A little forethought toward this open house should eliminate fussing many hours in its preparation. With decorating the tree, last minute gift preparations and many other demands for time, it is best to plan a meal, simple to prepare, but one that possesses an air of friendliness and cheer. It should, of course, be nourishing and should be one that stimulates invigorating body warmth.

Two such menus follow. The first may be a midnight snack, and the following one a daybreak breakfast suggestion that will bring new life to the most weary caroler.

- Potato Soup with Sausage Slices
- Celery Sticks
- Hot Buttered Toast
- Fruit Cake
- Coffee

- Red Orange Juice
- Creamy Scrambled Eggs with Chipped Beef
- Toasted Muffins
- Christmas Cookies
- Hot Chocolate

Potato Soup with Sausage Slices: 3 cups milk, 1 slice onion, 2 tsp. butter, 2 tsp. flour, salt and pepper, 1 cup mashed potatoes, 2 pig sausages.

Scald milk with onion in the top of a double boiler. Melt butter, add flour and seasoning and gradually stir in the hot milk from which the onion has been removed. Add mashed potatoes and return to the double boiler and beat until the mixture is perfectly smooth. Add crosswise slices of freshly cooked and browned sausages. Serve very hot. Serves 4.
