cannot climb the Umatilla rapids. It is equally vernacular that the tonnage is 90 per cent above. It is also assured that President Roosevelt has said that the Umatilla dam will be started while he is in the saddle. While it is an old story, these facts stare the public square in the face. Strategy and intrigue have defeated this, the most meritorious structure on the Columbia, and perhaps, maybe the day has arrived for the fulfillment of our hopes and expectations.

SCHOOL CAFETERIA PROGRESSES

The school cafeteria, under the able direction of Mrs. L. S. Burrell, serves on the average of 52 students every day. The menu consists of a hot dish, salad, dessert, and milk, and each day it is varied so that no dish appears on the menu twice in the same week.

The cafeteria was opened in October and during that month \$82.49 was taken in, and during December, \$128.77 of which \$16.50 was paid on a previous debt incurred in November.

"Hamburger days" have proved to be the most popular among the students, and "ice cream days" run a close second. The object of the cafeteria is not to make a profit but to serve a wholesome and nourishing lunch to the students at a minimum price.

Ralph Fix underwent an operation for appendicitis New Year's day and returned home Monday.

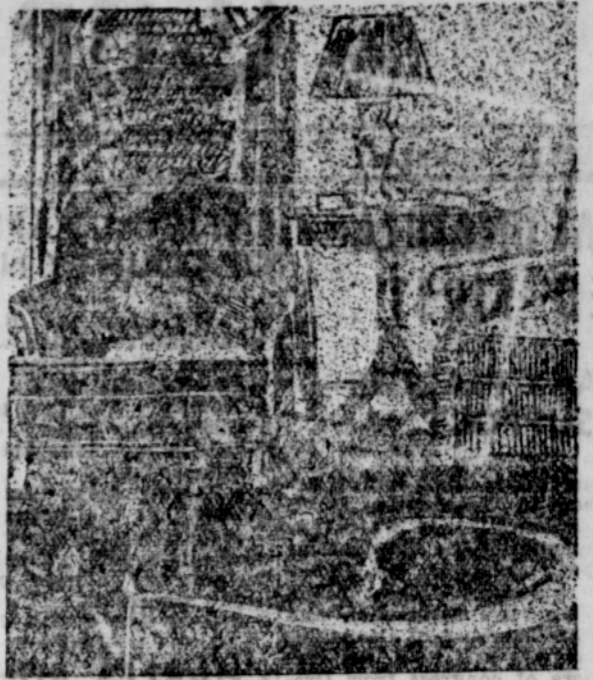
