IMPORTANT STATE TAX LAW RULINGS

Of vital importance to taxpayers of Oregon who failed to bring their property under the protection of the 1935 tax law and the 1937 amendment, is a ruling made public by Charles V. Galloway, chairman of the Oregon State Tax Commission.

As had been previously announced on January 1, 1938, it became mandatory on the part of the sheriff to issue a certificate of delinquency to the county against property not brought under the tax law and amendment on or before December 31, 1937.

How to remove this "cloud" on the title is the latest opinion delivered by Chairman Galloway. The decision reads:

"After December 31, 1937, and until the certificates of delinquency shall have been completed and filed with the county clerk in 1938, a property owner may forestall foreclosure in 1938 by paying the delinquent taxes of 1936 and 1937 in full, with interest, and two-quarters of the taxes of the earliest year of delinquency; (1934 and prior) with interest; or he can accomplish the same purpose by paying either the 1936 or 1937 taxes in full, with interest, and also the current 1938 taxes in full, with a like payment of two-quarters of the earliest year of delinquency (1934 and prior).

"Such payments would leave a property owner in the clear, as far as issuance and foreclosure of a certificate of delinquency in 1938 is concerned, for the reason that but one quarterly installment of the earliest year's delinquency, instead of two such installments, would remain due and payable in 1938, and the full payments of the taxes of two out of the three years of 1936, 1937 and 1938, would satisfy the requirement in that regard.

"However, we think the situation will be changed materially when the process of issuing certificates of delinquency shall have been completed on the filing of such certificates with the county clerk. Then, all rights and privileges given the property owner under said amended Chapter 5, Special Session Laws of 1935, will be terminated and the only recourse provided by law to stop foreclosure will be to redeem by paying all the taxes of the several years included in the certificate, with interest, penalties and costs."

Few property owners realized the seriousness of the situation when they permitted their real estate holdings to remain in jeopardy. It readily can be seen it would have been much easier financially to comply with the tax law prior to December 31, 1937, than it is today, and it becomes more difficult as the days pass.

Consequently, with certificates being prepared now for filing against such property affected in the 36 counties of Oregon, those who find this unnecessary "cloud" on the title should immediately go to the sheriff and tax collector and make arrangements to "pay off."

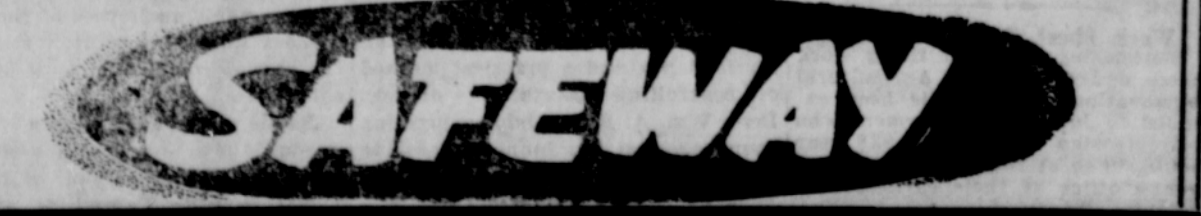
