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Who Knows the Answer?

Like all other strikes the newspaper in Portland affects many other innocent people. Coming now while unemployment is high, it has added to those rolls over 10,000 formerly paid workers, who are forced into idleness.

The great stores in Portland find their business greatly reduced through lack of advertising medium. This has been caused by a vote of 133, with 111 against the strike called by the American Typographical Union, a majority of only 22, with the main contention over arbitration as to whether the hours should be 7 or 7 1/2 per day.

At this range we do not pretend to know why a lot of old employees of the three newspapers should take the action they did. But if all other strikes have no greater grounds for action, we are not surprised at the number of strikes now going on throughout the United States.

The nation needs a greater purchasing power. This must come through the greater employment of labor and a greater resulting market for farm products. If strikes continue, it must result in a sidown strike of the farmers—everybody until adjustments are made on a parity basis, by which all may receive a fair reward for their labors.
