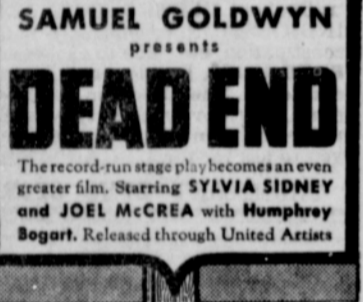

DAIRYMEN SEEK HIGHER PRODUCTION

The Umatilla-Morrow Dairy Herd Improvement association has just completed the year's work. There were 29 herds tested during the month of December with 360 cows enrolled. The average cow produced 415.3 pounds of milk, yielding 22.11 pounds butterfat.

High herd honors for the 20 or more cow group goes to F. A. Baker of Stanfield. High herd of 21 Jerseys produced an average of 347.1 pounds of milk and 21.52 butterfat.

In the 12 to 20 cow group honors go to Floyd Laird of Hermiston. His herd of 15 Jerseys produced 573.2 pounds of milk and 33.4 butterfat. In the less than 12 cow group, honors go to A. W. Turnblad of Hermiston. His herd of 10 milking Shorthorns produced 845.5 pounds of milk and 39.07 butterfat.

High cow for the month was owned by A. W. Turnblad. A four-year-old milking Shorthorn produced 1324 pounds of milk and 62.2 pounds of butterfat. Second high goes to a cow owned by Frank Seeliger, a registered Guernsey, which produced 1000 pounds of milk and 61 pounds of butterfat.

High cow in the three-year-old group was owned by Floyd Laird. A grade Jersey produced 372 pounds of milk and 52.0 butterfat. In the two-year-old group the high cow was owned by Carl Haddox. A grade Jersey produced 983 pounds of milk and 49.2 butterfat.

H. R. Hartley, tester for the association, reports that more interest is manifest in feeding grain to higher producing cows and feeding according to production. He also stated that there was more attention being paid to pastures in line with the size of the dairy herds.
