**Back to Private Life.**

United States Frederick Steiwer has resigned his office to take effect next Monday. His term would have expired January 1, 1939. His salary would have been nearly \$10,000 for the remaining period. He prefers to enter private life and the practice of law rather than remain longer in the high position he held.

Senator Steiwer has risen to national prominence in the United States senate. He was keynote of the last national republican convention. He was the leader of bonus legislation. He was sought as a speaker in many states during political campaigns and was western manager of congressional campaigns for his party in two national elections. Yet he gives up all this prestige and prominence, and salary, to return to the job of building a private law practice.

When asked why, he gives the plain and humble statement that it is his duty to himself and family.

This action may be difficult for some to understand, but perhaps the pace does not pay, is a heavy drain on health and strength, and lacks in the allurements of association with the mighty in government, which the common man thinks is highly worth while.

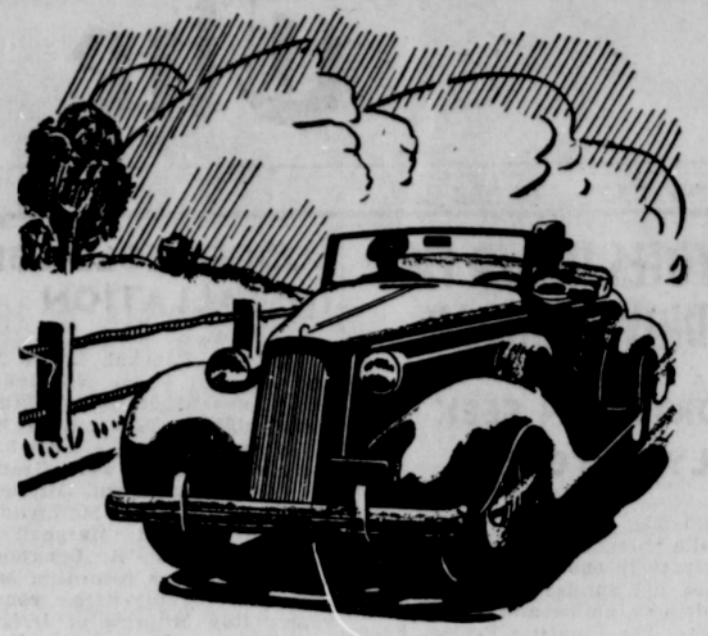
