NOTICE OF ANNUAL MEETING

FARM BUREAU CO-OPERATIVE OF HERMISTON

The annual meeting of the members of the Farm Bureau Cooperative of Hermiston, Oregon, will be held at the Hermiston Union church in Hermiston Friday, February 11, 1938, at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

Election of directors will be held to fill the expired terms of Directors H. J. Bean, District No. 1; J. H. Reid, District No. 3; R. G. Saylor, District No. 5.

A list of names is being mailed to the qualified voters in each district designated in the notice. An (x) should be placed before the name of the party desired as director, and the ballot brought to the meeting or mailed to the office of the Farm Bureau Cooperative of Hermiston. The list mailed out to the qualified voters is merely a nominating ballot. In order to elect the party desired as director, it is necessary that the members from the respective districts be present at the meeting to cast their final vote for election.

Eligibility of membership in the Farm Bureau Cooperative of Hermiston is based on membership in good standing in any Farm Bureau, Farmers' Union or Grange designated by the Board of Directors, and the payment of a life membership fee of one dollar to the Farm Bureau Cooperative of Hermiston.

All names received will be submitted to the voters present at the meeting and voted on by ballot. The person receiving the largest number of votes will be the director for a term of two years. Every effort has been made to include in their respective lists the correct names. Should an error be found, kindly notify the office of the Farm Bureau Cooperative immediately.

District No. 1, or Echo District, shall embrace the district lying south of the Union Pacific railroad from Hinkle eastward, and east of the Butter Creek highway toward Lena to a point intersecting the Morrow county line.

District No. 3, or South Columbia District, shall embrace that portion of the Hermiston project lying south and east of the diagonal road and the railroad through Hermiston, and the feed canal of the Hermiston Irrigation Project.

District No. 5, or Butter Creek Minnehaha District shall include all the territory west of the railroad through Hermiston and west of the Butter Creek highway to Lena.

At this annual meeting the members will be required to vote on a new set of by-laws recommended by the board of directors and submitted by them upon the advice of various cooperative experts and attorneys to bring the operations of the association more in harmony with existing cooperative and corporation regulations and laws which have been passed or amended since the original by-laws were adopted.

GOVERNOR NAMES COOPERATIVE WEEK

MADISON, WISC. — Governor Philip LaFollette has proclaimed the week of February 14-18 as Wisconsin Cooperative Week, urging that the people of the state "take inventory" of the possibility of "service through cooperative action," and suggested the widest possible use of radio, news channels and the schools that week for the study of the movement.

In his proclamation setting aside Cooperative Week, Governor LaFollette declared:

"To take inventory of the important part that cooperation is playing in the economic and social welfare of our people and to emphasize the possibilities of service through cooperative action, Wisconsin Cooperative Week will be observed from February 14 to 18 of this year."

"Today, more than ever, it is recognized that many of our problems must be solved by the people themselves, working together in general educational, commodity marketing and purchasing groups. If we are to attain the utmost good from cooperation, it is well to study and promulgate the principles of cooperative marketing as well as to acclaim the accomplishments of our various lines of cooperative endeavor in Wisconsin.

"It will be helpful to all to focus attention on this movement to extend the teaching of its principles, to define its place, and to interpret its functions.

"Now, therefore, I Philip F. LaFollette, governor of the state of Wisconsin, do hereby designate and proclaim the week of February 14, to 18, 1938, inclusive, as Wisconsin Cooperative week and urge the people of Wisconsin to avail themselves of the opportunities provided at the time by radio, through news media, and in the schools, to study cooperation and develop its possibilities for building a better society for us and our children."

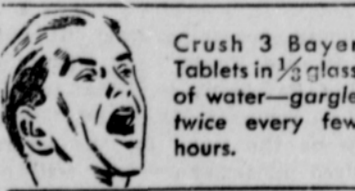
