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**The Wiring Job.**

The most important part of the new electric system just now is that house wiring job. With that in view the board of directors have arranged for a series of meetings when information may be secured from electrical men who will have no purpose except to assist farmers in choosing the best methods of wiring and the selection of the appliances best suited to their uses. These meetings should be attended by every man and woman in the district.

A proper study of these questions under direction of the state college extension service will result in important savings to every user. Those who listened to such men Wednesday at the board meeting learned that there is much more to be learned. These men can make the subject

clear and simple. They will be able to explain problems and answer questions, and, what is more important, instruct in the safe and economic uses of electricity.

The new power line will carry the juice to your homes, but good poles and the best wire and equipment will be of little service alone. The proof of the pudding will be in the proper facilities for use of that current. The government, the engineers and the board of directors may do their part ever so well, but without the hearty cooperation of those whom they seek to benefit, the enterprise will prove unworthy of the investment, and the spirit of the communities, who have brought it about.

Through active interest and careful study of their own needs, the benefits may be made abundant, and the costs of wiring and necessary appliances kept within the reach of every one.

**B Schools Tournament.**

Emil Pilus, famous Pacific Coast Conference official, will act as referee for the tournament here.

**STANFIELD CCC CAMP ACTIVITIES**

One might well wonder as he watches the trucks roll out from the CCC camp each morning, where they are going and what they are doing. A survey of their activities for the month of January should prove interesting.

On the Stanfield project their work has consisted of clearing and cleaning the Stanfield main canal of brush, silt and weeds, under H. J. Stillings as foreman; enlarging the Stanfield drain ditch with drag line, under the supervision of Harry Kelley; drilling and blasting the rock bluff along the main canal in order that the ditch may be widened and its capacity increased. This was under the direction of Leo Clark; and poisoning gophers with Elmer Williams in charge.

At Hermiston an accumulation of about a foot of silt is being removed from the bottom of the Maxwell ditch by hard labor, while the dump

trucks were being used in building and graveling a road along the bank of the ditch. Also some rock rip-rap was laid to strengthen the bank and keep the dirt from blowing. This work was done under the direction of Al Hiatt. Some old pipe lines were dug up and new line laid.

The rodent control crew finished its work at Stanfield and is now at work on the Hermiston project.

Work done in the Westland canal consisted of removing accumulated waste, silt, brush and weeds from the canal and widening the canal. This work was accomplished partially by hand labor and with caterpillar tractor. Some brush rip-rap was also laid to keep down sand blows which fill the canal. Charles Ratliff had charge of this work.

In the camp night classes are held which are presided over by the foreman of the camp. These classes are usually concerned with the practical problems connected with the work in which they are engaged during the day. A course in typing is also given under the direction of H. R. Poffenbarger, the Bureau of Reclamation clerk.

At present the commanding officer is Lieutenant Harold C. Wohlner, who is taking the place of Lieutenant Hower, who is in New York on leave.

Thirty-five enrollees recently arrived at the camp from Ohio. No accidents resulting in injury have occurred in the camp for the past four months, and those in charge are to be commended.

The high school and grade school basketball teams played at Boardman Tuesday night, losing to their opponents in the high school group, while the grade school won with a score of 20 to 8.
