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House Wiring Instructions.

The dates and places of meetings for education in wiring houses and use of appliances are announced in this issue of the Herald. These meetings will be wide open for all users on the new power line to ask questions and listen in on the subjects discussed by skilled electrical trained men. Every farmer should attend and endeavor to help himself solve his own problems. He will not only save money by doing so, but will be better able to construct a safer, more adequate and more permanent system for his premises.

The power line construction is progressing rapidly. Over 1000 poles have been set and wiring will be commenced next week. All materials have been shipped or are ordered and on the way, and the system will be completed by April 1st. It is high time to think about and prepare for that house wiring job, and be ready to take advantage of

the benefits to your homes.

In addition to this, any farmer along the lines as staked out, who has not become a member of the association, should do so before the wires are strung along the poles and transformers set.

Exhibit Building Improvement?

What has happened to our proposed improvement in the exhibit building on the fair grounds, making it into a meeting place? We understand that such committees were appointed last fall to carry this project through but have heard nothing further about it. Are we going to let it die the third death?

STANFIELD SCHOOL QUESTION DISCUSSED

STANFIELD NEWS—The School advancement association met Thursday evening in the high school with Mrs. R. G. Penney, president, presiding during the business meeting. Following the S. A. A. program the meeting was turned over to Earnest Sires, chairman of the school board who called upon R. G. Penney to report regarding the feasibility of discontinuing the high school at Stanfield. According to the report as presented, a substantial saving could be realized by becoming part of the non-high school district of the county. It would then be obligatory on the non-high school district to pay the cost of tuition of Stanfield high school pupils in some other high school, presumably Hermiston. The funds for the payment of this tuition would be derived from the non high school tax to which we would be subject. Martin Refvem was chosen to preside over the meeting and the matter was discussed pro and con. A vote was taken to determine the sentiment of the meeting which resulted in three affirmative votes to discontinue our high school. An election will be held on February 26 for the purpose of voting on this subject and to elect a member of the school board to take the place of R. G. Penney who recently resigned as a member of the board.

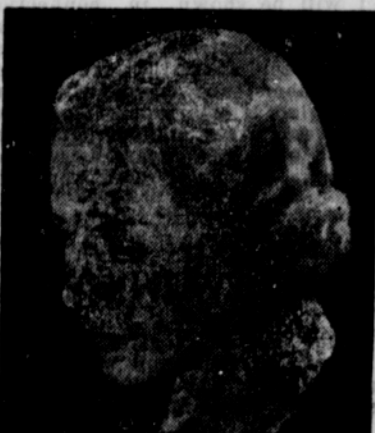
