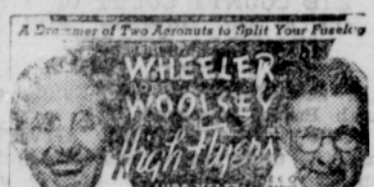
Ed Skoubo spent Sunday in Umatilla visiting at the home of Miss McKenzie.
