

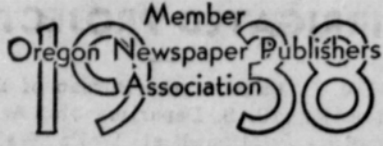

Mr. Folsom is completing his first term as recorder of conveyances. He is a native of Umatilla county, having been born at Albee in the Camas Prairie region. He reports a profit of \$1380.54, through collection of \$5750.54 of fees in 1937 and a budget of \$4370.

Mrs. De Hart will end her third term as custodian of the county's purse-strings on Dec. 31. She has resided in Pendleton for 19 years, having been born in Texas. She is a member of the Business and Professional Women's club and of the American Legion auxiliary. The treasurer's office is a four-year one.
