TWO NEW HERDS ADDED TO TEST

The Umatilla-Morrow Herd Improvement association report for February shows that Dr. A. E. Marble of Hermiston and H. M. Duus of Irigoin have enrolled their dairy herds in the association. It also shows that there are a total of 26 herds on test, with 349 cows enrolled, of which 54 are dry, producing 148,507 pounds of milk, containing 7460.5 pounds of fat. Twenty-one cows produced an average of 40 pounds of fat during the testing month. The average production, including cows in milk and cows dry, was 422.3 lbs. milk, and 21.37 lbs. fat.

The two high producing cows for the month were Twisty, a mature grade Jersey, owned by C. R. Smith, producing 876 lbs. milk and 56.9 lbs. fat; and Bell, a mature grade Jersey, owned by Floyd Laird, producing 806 lbs. milk, and 54.8 lbs. fat.

One cow in the association was sold, and two purchased by members for dairy purposes, the report shows. High herds of over 20 cows were owned by H. L. Payne, a mixed herd of 24 cows, averaging 431.3 lbs. milk and 21.38 lbs. fat. High herd of from 12 to 20 cows was owned by Floyd Laird, 15 grade Jerseys, averaging 530.0 lbs. milk and 32.06 lbs. fat. High herd under 12 cows was owned by Nick Falser, 6 Grade Holsteins, averaging 1231.0 lbs. milk and 40.20 lbs. fat.

High herds to date for the two months since the beginning of the testing year are as follows:

F. A. Baker herd, 21 Registered and Grade Jerseys, 869.9 lbs. milk, 46.18 lbs. fat; Dell Christley herd, 42 mixed breeds, 819.4 lbs. milk, 40.07 lbs. fat; Floyd Laird herd, 15 Grade Jerseys, 1209.6 lbs. milk, 69.69 lbs. fat; Carl Haddox herd, 13 Grade Jerseys, 1059.6 lbs. milk, 60.93 lbs. fat; C. R. Smith herd, 9 Holstein and Jerseys, 1432.9 lbs. milk, 68.90 lbs. fat; Nick Falser herd, 6 Grade Holsteins, 1970.0 lbs. milk, 67.60 lbs. fat.

Sally, 4 year old Grade Jersey owned by Floyd Laird, freshening in December, tested 764 lbs. milk and 45.8 lbs. fat as listed on the honor roll. Other cows on the honor roll are Lily, a 3-year-old Grade Jersey, also of the Laird herd, making a test of 728 lbs. milk and 46.6 lbs. fat. She freshened in November. Juliann, a 2-year-old Grade Holstein owned by Nick Falser, freshening in January, tested 1719 lbs. milk and 51.6 lbs. fat. Marge, a 2-year-old Grade Jersey owned by Dr. A. E. Marble, made 708 lbs. milk and 51.9 lbs. fat. White Baby, a 2-year-old Grade Holstein owned by Nick Falser, freshening in December, tested 1061 lbs. milk and 40.3 lbs. fat. Cotton, a 2-year-old Grade Jersey, owned by Dell Christley, tested 832 lbs. milk, and 39.1 lbs. fat.

This report is compiled each month by H. R. Hartley, employed as tester for the local association, which is filled with the state association and compared with other tests over the state.
