HOP GROWERS IN CONFERENCE

Oregon hop growers are in favor of holding a winter educational

conference and a summer field day at the Corvallis experiment station, they decided at a one-day conference held at the college late in March. They also voted in favor of holding a hop exhibit in connection with the conference, with prizes offered for the best hop samples shown.

A larger number of growers than ever before attended this latest conference and heard reports on the research work being carried on by nine different departments at the college. The growers also discussed the question of encouraging the establishment of centralized government labor camps where transient workers in the smaller yards could be housed.
