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Time to Register.
The registration books must be closed according to law thirty days before primary election, and all persons who desire to vote in the coming county, district and state primaries must be properly registered

by April 20, or two weeks from today, if the voter is a new citizen in his precinct; if he has previously failed to register, or if he has only moved out of one precinct into another, he must re-register if he desires to cast his ballot.

In addition to county officers, there will be some important legislative offices to fill, and the state selections of both democratic and republican nominees give promise of great interest. A United States senator, a governor, a member of congress from each district, secretary of state, and other state officers are to be nominated and elected this year. Many political principles will be discussed, and voters should be prepared to express their opinions.

"UNREALITY" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, April 3.

The Golden Text was, "The world passeth away, and the lust thereof; but he that doeth the will of God abideth for ever" (1 John 2:17).
Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "But as it is written, Eyes hath not seen, nor ear heard, neither have entered into the heart of man, the things which God hath prepared for them that love him. But God hath revealed them unto us by his Spirit; for the Spirit searcheth all things, yea, the deep things of God" (1 Cor: 2:9,10).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy: "The destruction of the claims of mortal mind through Science, by which man can escape from sin and mortality, blesses the whole human family. As in the beginning, however, this liberation does not scientifically show itself in a knowledge of both good and evil, for the latter is unreal."
"On the other hand, Mind-science is wholly separate from any half-way impertinent knowledge, because Mind-science is of God and demonstrates the divine Principle, working out the purposes of good only." (p. 103).

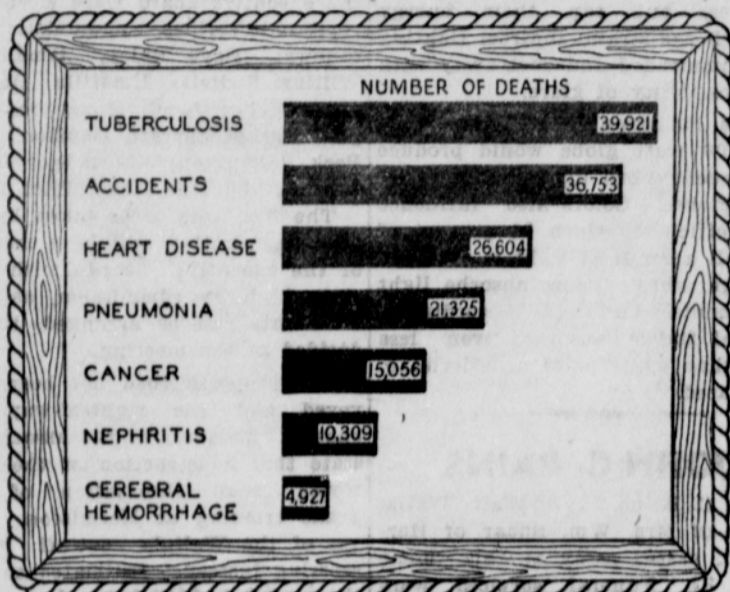

T. B.—First Cause of Death between 15 and 45



The illustration above, in showing the seven leading causes of death in the United States, reveals the startling fact that tuberculosis occupies first rank as the cause of death for the productive years between 15 and 45. Nearly 40,000 men and women in that age group died last year from this preventable disease. Tuberculosis accounted for almost 16 per cent of deaths from all causes during the 15 to 45 age period although it

was responsible for only 5 per cent of the total mortality for all age periods. The latest statistics show that the seven leading causes of death (shown above), called by some the "Seven Horsemen of Death," continue to be led by tuberculosis as a robber of lives in these highly important years. Until tuberculosis ceases to kill our young men and women in such large numbers Christmas Seals must be used as ammunition in the war on the Great White Plague.
