ESTIMATES ON WILD LIFE ANNOUNCED

The 1937 census of wild life on the 20 national forests of Oregon and Washington reveals substantial increases among many of the larger species, such as elk and mule deer, but serious problems regarding the fur-bearers and certain other forest denizens. Mule deer estimates have been revised upward by approximately 20,000 (bringing the total to 123,000) in the national forests of the two states as a result

of recent intensive deer counts. Elk, particularly in Oregon national forests, are reported increasing in spite of the annual open season. Mountain goats, under year long protection, are increasing steadily in Washington national forests, although figures of recent years have been revised downward this year on the basis of more intensive estimates.

Problems faced by sportsmen organizations and national and state wild life management are seen in the decrease of black tail deer on national forests, the fact that the numbers of mountain sheep have reached a standstill, and the serious decline in the population of the fur-bearers, especially beaver and marten. Among predatory animals, cougars appear to be increasing slightly while coyotes are estimated to have decreased. Ducks and geese are noticeably increasing, although mountain quail and blue and ruffed grouse still present a serious problem of depletion.
