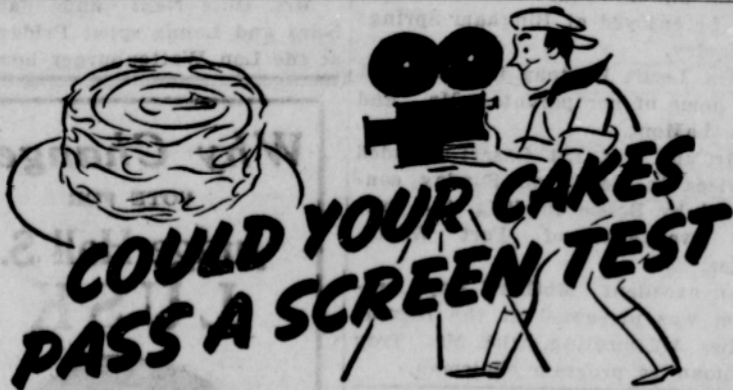

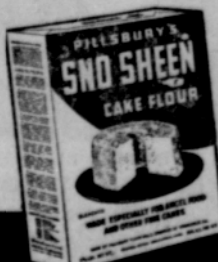

In 1936 I ran for the State Senate on the following platform: listed below is how I kept my pledges:

The farmers wanted more money for their county roads.

Umatilla county got a substantial increase, and the county now gets \$55,000.00 annually from the gas tax for these county roads.

Hermiston business men wanted the state appropriation for their experimental farm, and money for the college to do research work on the diseases of poultry.

They got both appropriations.

The Eastern Oregon Livestock show wanted \$5000.00 in 1937-38 for prize money to encourage the 4-H and Future Farmers boys and girls of Union, Umatilla and Morrow counties.

They got their \$5000.00 for two years to give as prize money for these boys and girls.

The old people wanted the Old Age Assistance Act reduced from 70 years to 65.

It was.

The Townsend memorial was passed through the Senate.

The Women's Club and sister organizations wanted an additional appropriation for the Doernbecker Hospital for crippled children and forty additional beds for the Eastern Oregon Tuberculosis Hospital at The Dalles.

Additional appropriations were made in each case, and The Dalles Hospital got their extra forty beds.

Certain citizens and temperance organizations wanted it unlawful for a boy or girl under twenty-one to misrepresent their age to get liquor.

I introduced and passed a law to this effect.

Labor wanted unemployment insurance to tide them over when they were out of employment; also State hospitalization to take care of their families if they contracted tuberculosis or infantile paralysis.

The State of Oregon now has unemployment insurance, additional hospital facilities to take care of the workingman's family if they contract these terrible diseases.

The farmers wanted the right to operate their trucks unhampered by the public utility commissioner.

I introduced and passed a law to this effect thru the senate but lost it by a few votes in the house.

The tax payer did not want new taxes treated nor any increase in the present State tax.

There were no new State taxes voted on the people nor was there any increase in the present state tax.

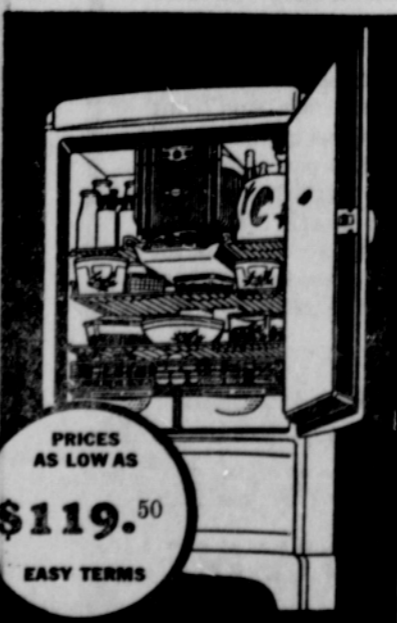
