Notice of Special Meeting

A special meeting of the members of the Farm Bureau Co-operative of Hermiston is called to meet at the Hermiston Union church in Hermiston, Oregon, May 20, 1938, at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon, for the purposes set forth in the following call of said meeting. Following is a true copy of the call for said meeting which call was in writing and signed by four of the members of the board of directors of the association.

RESOLUTION.

"RESOLVED that a special meeting of the members of the Association is hereby called to be held at the Hermiston Union church in Hermiston, Oregon, on May 20, 1938, at 2:00 o'clock P. M. for the purpose of authorizing the borrowing of a sum in excess of \$3000.00 and for the purpose of amending the by-laws of the corporation as follows:

(1) To amend Article II, Section 1 of by-laws to read as follows: 'Section 1. Membership in the Association shall be composed of persons who are producers of agricultural products, and who agree to comply with the requirements of the by-laws of the Association and the rules and regulations of the membership and board of directors.'

(2) To amend the first sentence of Article II, Section 5 of the by-laws to read as follows: 'Any member of the Association who ceases to be a producer of agricultural products, shall cease to be a member of the corporation, and, unless his membership certificate has been assigned or transferred with the consent of the board of directors as herein provided, the same shall be cancelled by the board at its next regular meeting or as soon thereafter as is convenient.'

BOWEN CONDEMNS ANY DISCRIMINATION AGAINST CO-OPS IN COAL LAW

Washington, D. C. — Protesting against any possible discrimination between cooperatives and private profit distributors under the National Bituminous Coal Commission Act, E. R. Bowen, general secretary of the Cooperative League of the U. S. A., told members of the coal commission at a public hearing here May 4 that "Consumers cooperative purchasing associations desire no special consideration, only the right to do business in the ordinary course of competition without regard to whether their stockholders are urban or rural residents and without regard to the legally required method by which they distribute their savings."

"Consumers cooperative purchasing associations," Mr. Bowen declared, "are required by their corporate charters to return any savings (which are termed profits in private business) after paying not more than a prescribed maximum rate of interest on capital stock (which is termed dividend in private business) and setting aside re-

serves to their stockholders on the basis of patronage. . . Such patronage returns of cooperatives are well understood not to be the same as discounts, dividends, allowances or rebates as ordinarily described."

"Since the law recognizes the right of consumers to organize cooperative purchasing associations," Mr. Bowen pointed out, "it follows that no law can be constitutional or enforceable which interferes with the right of any cooperative purchasing association to purchase any products and to receive prices and discounts commensurate with the distributive services they render."

"In America we believe in a fair and free field for all, whether private or cooperative organizations. Laws which are passed should insure rather than attempt to restrict the natural evolution through free competition of the most economical and efficient method of distribution of coal or any other product."

"CLIPPING DAY" FOR 4-H CLUBBERS

The Eastern Oregon Livestock Show will be held June 2-3-4 at Union, Oregon. Boys and girls who plan to participate in this show should get in touch with the assistant county agent immediately, so that their entries can be forwarded to Union. Boys and girls planning on attending the show, according to Mr. Pierson, should clip their calves and train them to lead, in order to make a creditable showing.

"Clipping day" for calves that will appear in the show, will be held Saturday, May 28, at the project fair grounds in Hermiston. A demonstration will be held throughout the day, and club members should make every effort to get their calves in for proper clipping. A trailer will be available for use in transporting the calves to and from the fair grounds during the day for those who do not have trailers of their own.

There will be \$1000 given in premiums and prizes for the 4-H club members at this show. These premiums are equal to those of the state fair and Pacific International Livestock Exposition. The awards will be as follows: (according to position cash listed.)

Beef Breeds:
Junior and senior fat steers, \$10, \$8, \$6, \$4, \$2, \$1; The county group of five steers, owned by 3 individuals, \$10, \$5, \$2.50.

Dairy Breeds:
Producing cows, two years and older, \$10, \$8, \$6, \$4, \$2, \$1; Heifers, one year and under, \$10, \$8, \$6, \$4, \$2, \$1; Heifers, over one year old, \$7, \$5, \$4, \$3, \$2, \$1; Bulls, one year and under two, \$10, \$5, \$2; Bull calf, \$5, \$4.

Graded herds, comprised of the following animals: one bull, one year old or under two; one cow, two years old or under; one two-year-old heifer; one heifer calf, \$14, \$7.

Sheep:
Yearling ewe, \$5, \$4, \$3, \$2, \$1; Ewe lamb, \$5, \$4, \$3, \$2, \$1; Fat lamb, \$5, \$4, \$3, \$2, \$1; Pen of 3 ewe lambs, \$10, \$5, \$2; Ram, yearling, \$5, \$4, \$2; Ram lambs under 1 year, \$5, \$4, \$2; Pen of 3 ram lambs, \$10, \$5, \$2.

Hogs:
Sow, farrowed since March 1, \$5, \$4, \$3, \$2, \$1; Barrow farrowed since March 1, \$5, \$4, \$3, \$2, \$1; Pen of 3 gilts, breeding farrow since March 1, 1938, \$6, \$5, \$3, \$2, \$1.

There will be special prizes for judging teams and showmanship. The first prize of these consists of a scholarship to summer school. There will also be a special prize for demonstration teams.
