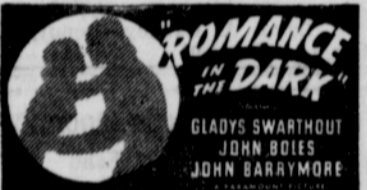

The 1938 baseball season closed with the Bulldogs again tied with the upper county league winners for Umatilla county championship. The Hermiston club won five games and lost two.

The team was one of the best balanced clubs in the school in recent years, with such veterans as S. Rankin, at catcher's post, and G. Keller pitcher; J. Knox on first with F. Furrer at second; M. Rankin on short, with J. Kerr holding down third, making up the starting infield. The outfield consisting of T. Lotspeich at left field, L. Hunt in center, and E. Moore at right field, to make up a tight field trio. These men were backed by Don Pankow, H. Neill and Albert Shipp.

The season's schedule consisted of three games with Umatilla, two with Athena, and two with Heppner. In these seven games the squad as a whole had a batting average of .363.
