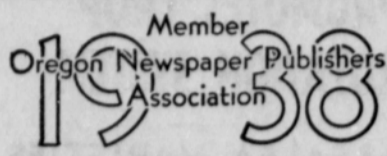

NEW ENROLLMENT MARK SET AT U. O.

University of Oregon, Eugene — New enrollment records were not only set for each of the three terms at the University of Oregon this school year, but each term, in spite of an increase in students, showed a much lower figure for withdrawals, it was announced by C. L. Constance, assisting registrar.

Fall term of this year reached a total of 3120 students in actual attendance of whom only 77 dropped out. Last year with an enrollment of 2904, withdrawals totalled 81 for this term. Winter term this year showed an enrollment of 3,027, with a withdrawal of 66, compared to last year when with enrollment of 2794, the withdrawals were 84. Spring term this year brought 2,874 students, of whom but 28 dropped out, compared to 2604 a year ago with 37 leaving before they finished the term.

A new cumulative enrollment record of 3440 was also set this year. Last year the cumulative figure was 3188.

The Golden Text was, "Why art thou cast down, O my soul? and why art thou disquieted within me? hope thou in God: for I shall yet praise him, who is the health of my countenance, and my God" (Ps. 42:11).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "Now the Lord is that Spirit: and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is liberty. But we all, with open face beholding as in a glass the glory of the Lord, are changed into the same image from glory to glory, even as by the Spirit of the Lord" (II Cor. 3:17,18).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy: "Identity is the reflection of Spirit, the reflection in multifarious forms of the living Principle, Love. Soul is the substance, Life, and intelligence of man, which is individualized, but not in matter. Soul can never reflect anything inferior to Spirit" (p. 477).
