 Mrs. Alice Wells of Pendleton arrived Saturday to visit her son Orbie Wells and family, and old friends.

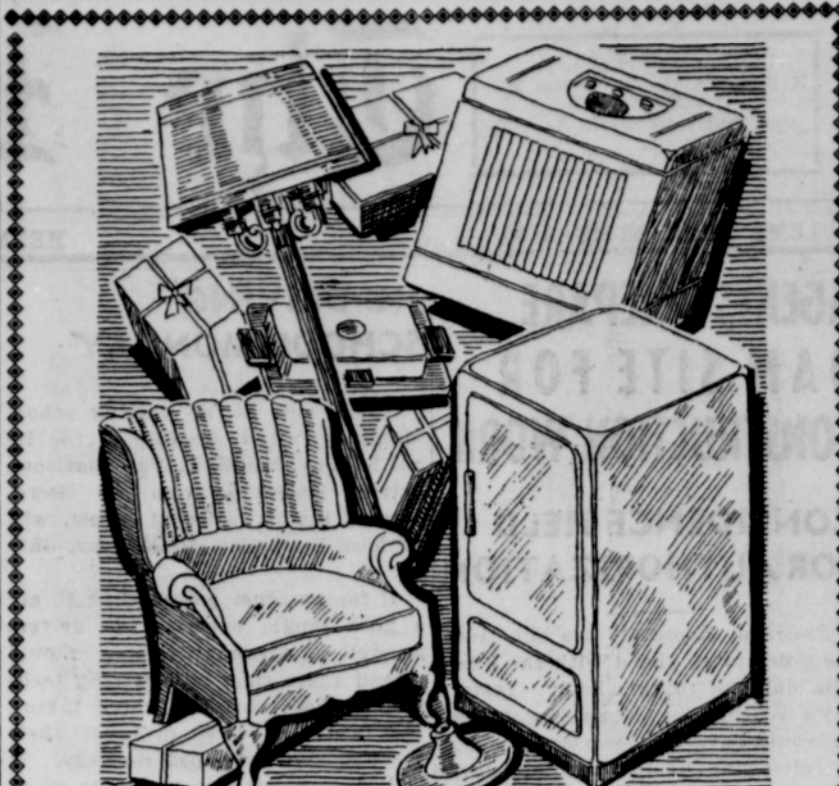
