One Delay More.
 The president has seen fit to withhold appropriation for immediate construction of the Umatilla rapids dam. In his statement he did not discourage construction of the dam but was quite indefinite as to when same could be accomplished.
 He questioned only the feasibility of using PWA funds from the allotment granted by congress. He did not refer to the use of any other fund under the national recovery appropriation. That may follow.
 After all the apparent approval by the administration and congressional delegations from the three Northwest states, and the strong support of all the army engineers and the people of practically the entire northwest, the announcement is very disappointing. It is almost dumbfounding.
 We may raise the question of politics, or secret influences, or sectional objections, but the merits of the project have been for some

reason, temporarily set aside. With two score of engineers working at the dam site, making preparations to "go with a bang," when the order came; with all newspapers granting that the project was "in the bag"; with members of congress assured and giving assurance that there could be no doubt this time; why all this was allowed to happen, and then spread the black cloud of disappointment and discouragement is beyond the ken of ordinary citizens.

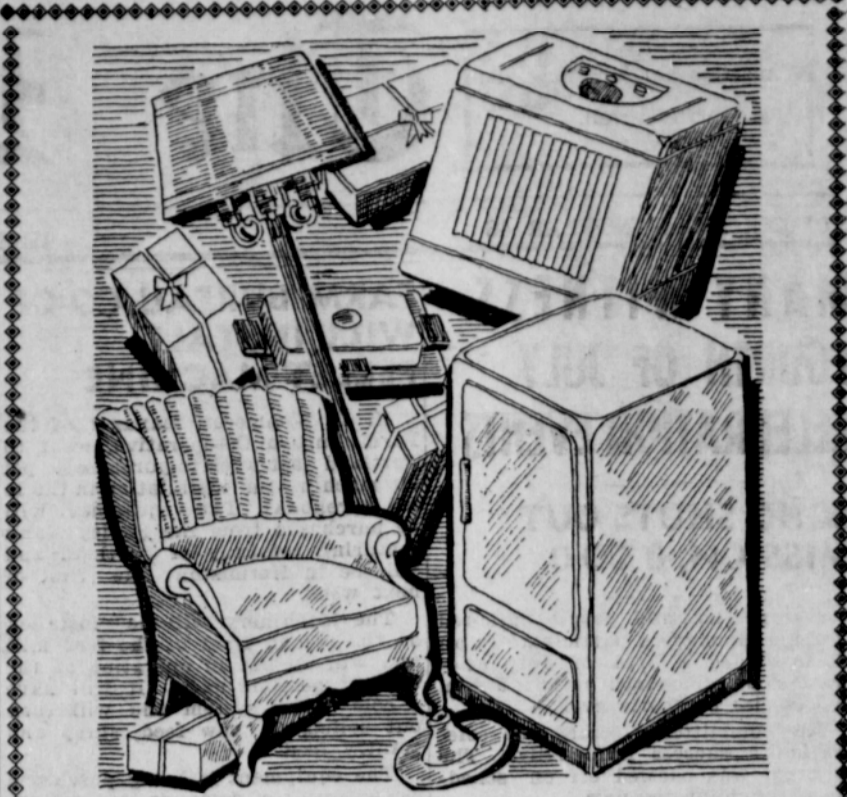
