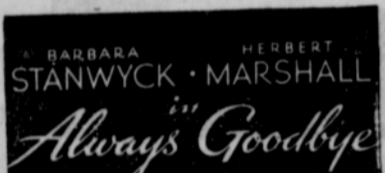

Dorothy Mustard left Monday for Spokane where she will be at the home of her aunt.

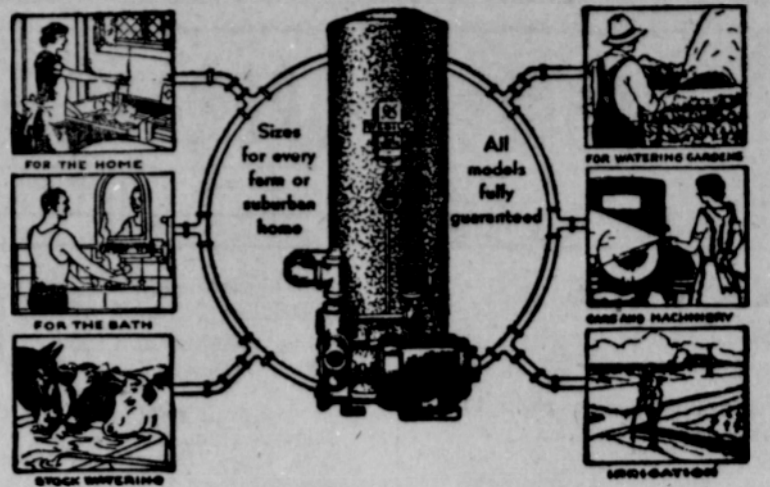
Mr. and Mrs. James Byrnes and Joan spent Monday in Walla Walla on business.

Beverly Mustard returned to the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Mustard, from Spokane where she has been working.



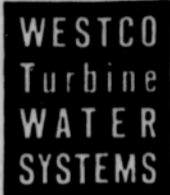
