



4H Clubbers Will Again Compete for Plummer Trophy Award

4-H Club teams from 6 Western states will compete in demonstrations of their projects on Tuesday, October 4, and Wednesday, October 5 at the Pacific International Livestock Exposition in Portland, October 1 to 9 inclusive.

Each competing team will consist of four members, two boys and two girls from each state, who will have been duly qualified by elimination contests held first in communities and then in all counties of the states represented.

Competition promises to run high because the winning team will carry home the much coveted, large silk American flag which for the thirteenth consecutive year represents the trophy awarded by O. M. Plummer, general manager of the exposition.

"We have been very much gratified with the results obtained through these competitive demonstrations of the actual work accomplished by 4-H boys and girls from year to year," stated Mr. Plummer in discussing the annual contests. "The demonstrations have proven intensely interesting to the public in general and of practical value to club members who are given an opportunity to display their own achievements and gain knowledge and experience from the demonstrations and work of other members."

Work done with livestock and agricultural products will be demonstrated by the boys while the girls will show what 4-H Club

training has done for them in the field of home economics.

Final award to the winning team will be based as usual on the average number of points won by both boys and girls of the same team rather than in the total number of points gained.

Teams which will compete in the six-state contests for the Plummer Trophy will receive from the Exposition 50% of their transportation and other expenses, up to the following amounts per state: Montana, \$100; Utah, \$150; Nevada, \$100; Idaho, \$75; Washington, \$50 and Oregon, \$25. The allowance is determined by the distance teams must travel to the Exposition.

The amounts allowed are based upon two teams of two members each from each state. In the event of fewer teams or members, the funds will be pro-rated on the basis of four members. Additional money will be supplied by community and other interested organizations.

Executives of the Pacific International Livestock Exposition are highly optimistic regarding this year's attendance and stated that they are confident that the nine-day program of education and entertainment, October 1st to 9th will provide plenty of interest for all. The entertainment program of Horse Show and Rodeo will include for the first time, exhibitions for a crack drill team from Canada's world famous Cavalry Regiment "Lord Strathcona Horse."
