### Thistle Control Method Found.

OREGON CITY—The planting of chewings fescue is being recommended as the cheapest and most effective method of controlling Canada thistle in Clackamas county. County Agent J. J. Inskip first noticed that chewings fescue crowded out the thistles on the county poor farm several years ago. Trials were

then established on weed patches on the farms of Ben Elmer, Clarkes; Richard Polehn, Redland; Everett Springwater and Chris Johnson of George, and in each case results were the same. The thistles become stunted in growth after the first year, and few of them make seed. By the end of four years the thistles have nearly if not completely disappeared.
