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Agriculture Stands On Own Feet.

Agricultural cooperators from almost every corner of the nation reaffirm their faith in self-help as the dominant factor in bringing farm prosperity, at the recent annual meeting of the American Institute of Cooperation.

Scores of speakers addressed the 1,010 delegates—and practically all of them dwelt on the theme of self-sufficiency. Strong warnings against the "let the government do it" attitude were uttered. The virtues of marketing cooperation were stressed.

This speaks well for the character

of American agriculture. The farmer wants a fair chance—but he doesn't want to be a ward of paternal government, as the rapid growth of the marketing cooperatives mutely testifies.

International Friendship.

It has been suggested that the King and Queen of England be invited to attend the San Francisco and New York expositions, to be held during 1939. And certainly, a visit of Their Majesties to this country would be a splendid gesture to a troubled world, illustrating as it would the firm friendship that exists between the two great English-speaking democracies.

Furthermore, there is plenty of past precedent for such an invitation, and for its acceptance as well. The King and Queen recently paid a state visit to France, another of England's old friends and allies. And President Roosevelt, though he has not gone abroad since becoming

Chief Executive, has visited South America and Canada in furthering his "good neighbor" policy. When the head of a major nation goes to a foreign land, sees and is seen by its people, the immensely important cause of better international understanding is substantially furthered.

The invitation to the King and Queen should come not only from officials of this government, but from the public as well—from editors in every section of the U. S.—who represent the millions of Americans who desire peace and friendship between nations. To these

citizens, such a visit would not be a mere formal expression of good will. It would typify the genuine regard that exists between the United States and the British Empire. And next year, when untold numbers of people will go to New York and San Francisco for the expositions, is the logical time.

SPRAGUE ROUND-UP VISITOR THIS WEEK

Portland, Sept. 15—After a busy time last week greeting state fair visitors and a number of important conferences at his headquarters here putting final touches on the coming campaign program, Charles A. Sprague, republican candidate for governor, swings into action this week with an appearance among the notables at the Pendleton Round-Up and a program date at the state convention of the Oregon Republican clubs.

Most encouraging sign, according to the republican nominee, is the number of non-partisan and democratic groups which are offering support.

Recent non-partisan groups to be organized include those in Oregon City, Bend, Tillamook and Baker.

Declaration that the governor's task is to work for the well being and general prosperity of Oregon, and that his program for the state, his knowledge of the state and his desire to end turmoil and assure general progress are more important to Oregon than national issues has characterized Sprague's recent utterances.

MOTHER CAREY'S CHICKENS SHOWN

Bubbling with the humor and naturalness that made the original Kate Douglas Wiggin story, one of the best-sellers of its day, the film version of "Mother Carey's Chickens" starts Sunday at the Oasis theatre.

Closely following the book, the film deals with the interesting careers of the Careys. The head of the family, a naval officer, dies during the war with Spain, and his wife and four children, left penniless save for a scanty pension, try to carry on as their father would have wished.

Through the efforts of a young school teacher who is in love with

the older daughter, the Careys leave the tenement in which they are living and take over an old, tumble-down house in the country. They remodel it as a teachers' boarding house, but unforeseen complications arise just as they complete the task. The climax is charged with hilarity as the family adopts a unique method of disposing an unpleasant couple who claim their house.

Against this background are played interlocking romances between the two daughters and their respective admirers, all thoroughly steeped in the colorful atmosphere of the late nineties and enriched with Miss Wiggin's sparkling comedy.

Anne Shirley and Ruby Keeler, as the daughters, are cast romantically opposite Frank Albertson and James Ellison, respectively.

UNEMPLOYMENT CLAIM BOOKS NEEDED

Salem, Ore., Sept. 14—Claimants for benefits under the unemployment compensation law who lose or misplace their individual claim books penalize themselves in delayed payments, Administrator D. A. Bulmore stated, in warning against carelessness with a possession comparable to a bank book.

Claimants who call at employment offices to renew claims for compensation without their claim books are required to make further search for them. If they are still missing a week hence, a new book is made out, but this entails delay and claimant loses at least a week in obtaining benefits, the administrator pointed out.

Claimants also were warned against mailing their claim books into the central office at Salem in cases where interruptions in processing occur. The individual book should not be surrendered, but should be available for reference and presentation at employment office for renewal of claims, he said.

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen. Through faith we understand that the worlds were framed by the word of God, so that things which are seen were not made of things which do appear" (Heb. 11:1,3).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy: "Substance is that which is eternal and incapable of discord and decay. Truth, Life, and Love are substance, as the Scriptures use this word in Hebrews: 'The substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen.' Spirit, the synonym of Mind, Soul, or God, is the only real substance" (p.468).
