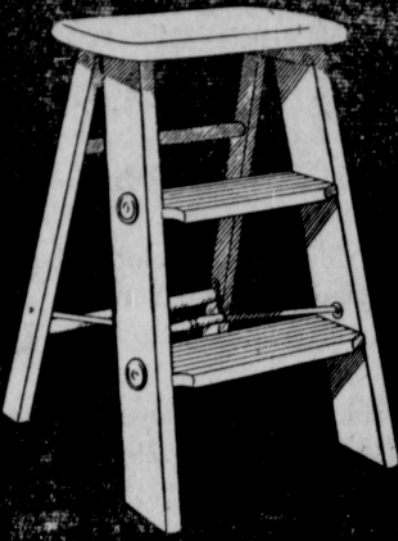

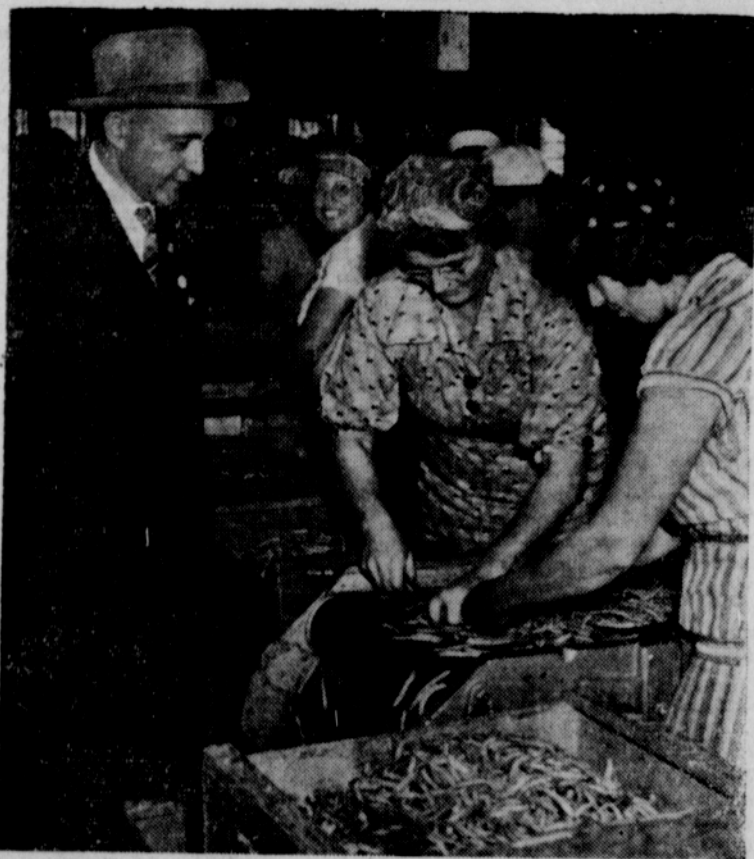

## How Wheat Crop Insurance Works

FARMER BUYS INSURANCE



— PAYS PREMIUM INTO RESERVE



IF CROP IS LOST

FARMER IS PAID FROM RESERVE

Oregon wheat growers are turning in applications for crop insurance in numbers indicating considerable popularity of the plan, reports Clyde Kiddle, state supervisor of insurance. Some 300 applications had been received by the middle of August soon after blanks were distributed to county offices.

How the plan works is illustrated by the application received from A. R. Koppock, chairman of the Umatilla county agricultural conservation committee. Records show that

Koppock's average yield has been 42 bushels per acre. He has applied for 75 per cent coverage for next year, which means that he will be certain of having at least 31½ bushels per acre to market even if his entire crop should be destroyed for some reason. This will cost him just .5 bushel per acre in premium.

If he chooses to do so, Mr. Koppock can turn over a bushel per acre and have his premiums cared for for two years, subject to slight possible adjustment. The premium rate varies

from county to county according to past records of losses, but in no Oregon county is the rate more than 2 bushels per acre and in most counties it is less than one bushel for 75 per cent coverage.

Closing date for receiving insurance applications in Oregon is November 30. In any case, however, application must be made before fall seeding is completed. Either 50 per cent or 75 per cent coverage may be obtained.

## Ready for Pendleton Round-Up



Pendleton, Ore., Aug. 26.—The yip of the cowboy and the thud of the tom-tom sounds now as Pendleton, with banners flying and with its citizens in loud shirts and sombreros, gets all set for the 29th annual Round-Up, Sept. 15, 16, 17.

Purses of \$9000, as well as prize saddles and other trophies, are offered for bronco riding, steer bulldogging, calf and steer roping, pony express race, cowboys' and cowgirls' relay races, all world championship events, and for stage coach race, squaw race, amateur bucking, free-for-all Indian race, cowgirls' pony race, Indian relay and Round-Up derby. Non-competitive exhibition events are riding bucking bulls and Brahms steers, trick riding and fancy roping.

Daily, at the grounds, is held the great cowboy, cowgirl and Indian parade; the Westward Ho! parade is a Friday event, at 10 a. m., on Pendleton streets. For night entertainment the Round-Up provides the far-famed Happy Canyon pageant, which, like the Round-Up is a community show.
