**'PROFESSOR BEWARE'  
STARTING FRIDAY**

A comedian's life is not all beer and skittles, take it from Harold Lloyd, who declares that scenes from his latest film, "Professor Beware," which starts Friday at the Oasis Theatre, have given him some of the most unforgettable moments in his entire screen career.

Perhaps the most famous single object on the screen throughout the years has been the horn-rimmed, lenseless glasses which Lloyd employs on the screen. He first adopted them back in the two reeler days, and they are still as much a part of his characterization in "Professor Beware" as they were originally.

The story of their adoption goes back to a day many years ago when he happened to witness a dramatic picture, in which the hero, a peaceful parson, who wore glasses, suddenly became a raging tornado when aroused by the villain. Lloyd, looking for something to supplant his "Lonesome Luke" characterization figured the spectacles would create the impression desired, that of complete placidity, so he bought the first pair he could locate. The lenses were done away with immediately because of the light reflection.

The glasses caught on. The wistful, sympathetic young American who appeared so helpless and yet who was able to display, when occasion demanded, the proverbial American fighting spirit, became famous.

**STUDENT EARNINGS  
AT OSC FOUND HIGH**

Oregon State College—OSC students earned last year a total of \$212,380.28, when scholarships, fellowships and NYA payments are included, according to figures gathered by E. B. Lemon, registrar, at the request of the central office of the state system. This figure does not include student loan fund distribution in the amount of \$38,406.

Items in the total are as follows: NYA, \$35,158.14; state scholarships, \$5,683.50; fellowships, \$31,441.68; college labor roll, \$79,455.96; placement through men's employment service, \$44,876; placement through women's employment service, \$15,765.

Mr. Lemon points out that even this figure is probably incomplete, inasmuch as many students obtain work without the fact being recorded by college authorities. In all probability such earnings would add about \$20,000, he said. Student earnings during the summer vacation period are difficult to estimate, but from self-help figures included on registration blanks, Lemon believes that such summer earnings aggregate about \$420,000.

**COLLECTORS OFFERED  
SPECIAL T. B. STAMPS**

PORTLAND, Sept. 20 (Special)—Honoring four men who have contributed much to the fight on tuberculosis, a pane of stamps, designed primarily for collectors, now is available at the headquarters of the Oregon Tuberculosis association in the Woodlark Building here and the various county public health associations of the state.

The pane, or souvenir panel, includes not only a replica of this year's Christmas Seal but also portraits of Laennec who discovered the stethoscope; Koch of Germany who proved that tuberculosis was spread by germs; Trudeau who established the first tuberculosis sanatorium in the United States and Holbott who started the first Christmas Seal sale to raise funds to fight the disease.

As a special inducement to collectors, officers of the National Tuberculosis association have announced that only 25,000 copies of the pane have been printed in the whole United States and that there will be no

reprints. The panes sell for 25 cents each and may be bought by mail or directly from the county or state headquarters.

**4-H CLUBBERS  
WILL BE SELECTED**

While 4-H members of Umatilla county await selection of an outstanding boy and girl from their group, judges who will announce the choice are studying the achievement and leadership record of each contestant preparatory to making a final choice later in the month. The judges in this county are Miss Frances Clinton, home demonstration agent, W. A. Holt, county agricultural agent, J. A. Yeager, county school superintendent, and Will Glass, manager of the Pendleton branch of the First National Bank of Portland.

In recognition of their achievements, the two winning 4-H clubbers will be in Portland, October 5, 6 and 7 to attend the Pacific International Livestock Exposition as guests of The First National Bank of Portland. All entertainment and transportation will be arranged by the bank, cooperating with H. C. Seymour, Oregon 4-H club director.

In Portland the winners will join outstanding club members from other counties in the state, and the huge party will register in a body at one of the large hotels under the chaperonage of a bank officer.

Selection of each boy and girl will be based on a system of achievements worked out by Mr. Seymour which records individual activities in 4-H club work. Last year's guests from Umatilla county were Erma Rencken of Freewater and Leo Rueber of Stanfield.
