Miss Mary Burnham will leave Saturday for Ellensburg where she will attend the fall and winter term at the Ellensburg Normal.

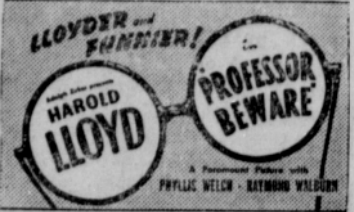

back Marvin Rankin, and fullback Ralph Marble out of the game because of injuries, Pasco scored two more touchdowns and one point. In the last few minutes of play with the count 31 to 0, Alfred Shipp got off a 65 yard punt that put Pasco well back toward their own goal. Marvin Rankin let go a 60 yard kick earlier in the game.

Pasco lost some fifty yards because of off-sides, holding on, and clipping, while the Bulldogs' only penalty was an off-side. The fact that the local team had not had the experience that is needed, stood out very plainly, especially in the line. Most of the Hermiston players are playing their first year of football.
