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ABOUT THE DAM.

The latest news report about the Umatilla dam states that Senator Schwalenbeck of Washington, had an interview with the president September 23, in which the president stated that he would do all he could to have the next congress, meeting in January, endorse a bill calling for the necessary allotment.

If this is true at this stage, the outlook is not very encouraging. What the next congress will do for the president is yet difficult to predict. Only one of the nine prominent candidates for senate and lower house whom he opposed was successful in winning nomination, and the November elections are yet to be held. Besides the eastern forces in Congress are not friendly to west ern appropriations.

It is definitely known that the president is friendly to the construction of the Umatilla dam, and it is likely he may yet find a way. It is also much in the hands of our north-west delegation. If members of congress and the leading state officials of the three northwest states devote their energies in behalf of early construction of the Umatilla rapids dam, they can do much to determine the action of Mr. Roosevelt.

The argument is all in, the project has been approved by the army board, engineers have been on the grounds for weeks and everything is reported ready for construction. The delay can be interpreted either by forces working within, or by political expediency.
