NEW UNION CHURCH BUILDING WILL BE DEDICATED SUNDAY

SPECIAL SERVICES SET FOR 2:15 P. M.

The Hermiston Union church dedication program has been completed for Sunday, October 23, starting with the Sunday school at 10:00 o'clock in the morning and continuing throughout the day. The building is located on the corner of Hermiston Avenue and Fifth street, east of the Catholic rectory.

The regular service was held for the first time in the new church Sunday, October 2, moving from the building which has been purchased by the Umatilla Cooperative Creamery to be utilized in an expansion program proposed by the creamery. Worship services had been conducted in that building for nearly four years.

Sunday's program will open with Sunday school at 10:00 a. m., the opening service being conducted by the high school class.

G. E. Williams, field representative of the Turner Memorial Home, will give the morning address. Dan Lindsay will give a vocal solo. Following the morning service a basket dinner will be served to which the public is invited, each family bringing a basket dinner and table service.

Official dedication of the building will be held at a service starting at 2:15 in the afternoon with B. Ross Evans, state evangelist for the Church of Christ in charge. Words of greeting will be heard from W. E. Jones, former pastor, of Willamina, Ore. Musical numbers will be given by Mr. and Mrs. Ben Gerking, duet, Pendleton; male quartet, Alfred Quiring, Ben Gerking, R. G. Saylor and J. A. Clarke; solo by Dan Lindsay; and a mixed quartet, Mr. and Mrs. Ben Gerking and Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Clarke.

A special service has been planned for Christian Endeavor by the young people, lead by Miss Catherine McMullen, commencing at 6:45 o'clock with a pre-prayer service.

The evening worship service at 8:00 o'clock will be the opening of an evangelistic campaign by B. Ross Evans, evangelist. Musical numbers will consist of a solo by Bert Salisbury and number by the male quartet.

A time will be set during the day for pictures to be taken. The public is invited to all services.

HIGH SCHOOL JOURNALISTS WILL TALK SHOP AT U. O.

Many phases of high school journalism will be discussed and new ideas sought at the 13th annual high school press conference, to be held at the University of Oregon school of journalism October 21 and 22. Geraldine Mullins, editor of the Hermiston Hi Bulldog, and Bill Belt, assistant editor, left Wednesday night to attend the conference.

The local high school publication has been entered in a contest to determine the best high school newspaper in the state, and the winners will be announced at the meeting.

The session, which will bring more than 120 high school newspaper and annual editors and managers to the campus, will open Friday morning with a talk by Eric W. Allen, dean of the school of journalism, on "Getting the Paper Started". Wendell Wyatt, of Jefferson High school, Portland, will lead the discussion. Paul Deutschmann, Eugene, editor of the Emerald, university daily, will talk on the editorial page; Raymond Lindgren, Forest Grove Moan, will describe features, and Alan Robertson, editor of the Carlton Hi Life, will speak on mimeograph papers.

THIRD PERIOD PASS BRINGS 6-0 VICTORY TO BUCKAROOS

A sturdy Hermiston high school football team left Round-Up field late Saturday afternoon with just two omarj regrets.

The first, and most important, was that Frank Young was able to shift his position quick enough to nab Cloyd Dunham's well-thrown forward pass midway in the second period, and then elude the Bulldog defensive man to race across the last white line virtually untouched. That made the score 6 to 0 for Pendleton high.

The second, and almost as important, was that an end—hidden almost behind the person of Tuck Hodgen, head lineman—couldn't quite manage to hang onto a "touch down pass." That was early in the fourth quarter and if it had succeeded, it might have tied the score.

But the Hermiston lads did go home with the realization that they had played a bang-up game against the Pendleton Buckaroos, and here fans were saying that Jack Hodgen, their coach, had turned out a pretty fine eleven with all 1937's starters but one shorn from the squad by graduation.

True, Coach By Haines was without his burly left guard, Jack Olsen, and a couple of zippy backs, Duane Conner and Guy Wyrick—crippled in scrimmages the last week. True also, By's boys didn't go much beyond straight football and seven attempted forward passes—of which three were completed. But nevertheless, those up and coming Bulldogs from over Hermiston way turned in a very good account of themselves, and Pendletonians who had the game sized up as a "breather," breathed a little easier when the final gun sounded.

The Bucks weren't fooling round, either. Against a team stronger than they expected, they played well, both in the line and backfield, both on offensive and defensive.—East Oregonian.

The next two games will be played on the local field, the first with Mac-Hi, November 4; the second with Heppner, November 11.

The high school band will make its initial performance in public at these two games. It is hoped the new band uniforms will be ready by that time.

CROPS BELIEVED BEST IN TEN YEARS

A crew of men are now busy cleaning the feed canal from its source at the Umatilla river above Echo to the Cold Springs reservoir, in preparation for running water as soon as the supply in the river is sufficient.

There is a head of about 40 second feet in the river at the head gates at present, and it is expected that as soon as the work is completed on the canal that water will be turned through the headgates. There is still good storage in the reservoir and water is being run through the distribution system for use on pastures and for use in fall seeding.

Two ditch riders are at work taking the annual crop census of the Umatilla project and will call on all farmers for their production for the season of 1938. A general estimate indicates that the crops for this year, including all forms of agriculture, have been the largest for over ten years.

DEETER BABY CROWNED QUEEN

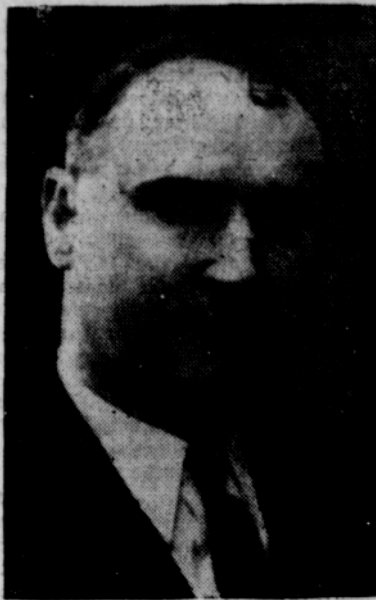

TRANSPORT COMPANY HEARS WITNESSES ON RIVER TONNAGE IN INLAND EMPIRE

Development of port facilities at Umatilla and the handling of an immense tonnage of petroleum products was the occasion that called four witnesses from this locality this week to appear at a hearing before a representative of the Interstate Commerce Commission in Portland. The witnesses were Mayor J. C. Tucker of Umatilla, Walter Smith, president of the Hermiston Commercial club, R. G. Penney, representing the Grange and cooperative organizations, and E. P. Dodd, representing the river interests. In addition, there were witnesses from Pendleton, Walla Walla, Lewiston and Boise, Idaho.

The witnesses were called by the Asbury Transportation company of Los Angeles and Portland, which operates a line of trucks from Portland into the interior as far east as Pocatello. This company had made application to handle petroleum products from the boats at Umatilla to all points in eastern Oregon and Washington, and into all parts of Idaho. Other truck companies also appeared before the examiner of the Interstate Commerce Commission. Sitting with him in the hearing were representatives of the Public Utilities Commission of Oregon, Washington and Idaho. The hearing was held at the Multnomah hotel with over 50 witnesses and a dozen attorneys present, representing the applicants and protestants.

LOCAL TURKEY GROWERS TAKE GRADING TESTS

Salem—J. Jendrzewski and H. G. Rankin of Hermiston were among 27 persons who successfully passed the examinations for a grader's license at the annual turkey grading school held last week, October 13 and 14, at Eugene, according to an announcement of Charles Cole, federal state supervisor with the state department of agriculture.

The Hermiston men are now on the department's eligible list for licensing and work during the coming season.

At the school the attention of the prospective graders was called to changes in former grade requirements for dressed turkeys. Thomas W. Heitz of the bureau of agricultural economics said that no wing feathers will be allowed on turkeys this year. All feathers around the garter and on the neck above the head wrap must be removed. No dirty feet will be permitted and vents must be clean, Heitz pointed out.

The new, more rigid requirements are considered necessary to prevent decay and spoilage resulting from the work of destructive bacteria. Feathers and dirt carry these bacteria. Prospective graders were also instructed to grade down heavily for the presence of pin feathers.

FALL TURKEY POOL DATES SET

The Eastern Oregon Turkey Growers' association held a meeting Monday night to set dates for the Thanksgiving and Christmas pools. The first pool will be held November 9-10; the second, November 29-30-December 1; and the third pool, December 11-12-13.

Changes in the general requirements that apply to all grades were discussed and a letter read that will be sent to all growers. Most drastic changes are that all feathers must be removed including neck feathers, above the head wrap, garters around the knees and fan feathers on the wing tips. Turkeys with dirty feet, dirty vents, or with dirty or bloody head or bodies are considered below grade. Growers will be required to adhere to these new regulations.

A killing demonstration is being planned in the near future when these new requirements will be emphasized. Merrill Potter will give a demonstration of wing tip feather pulling. N. L. Bennion will conduct the killing demonstration. He is extension poultryman from Oregon State college. The date of the demonstration will be announced later.
