WEST UMATILLA COUNTY CITY OFFICE CANDIDATES LISTED

VOTERS TO POLLS NOVEMBER 8TH

The four towns in the west end of Umatilla county will hold city elections Tuesday during the time the polls are open for the general county and state election.

C. H. Esseltyn and Edward Liesegang are nominees for Mayor at Echo, which is the only contest. In the council Dr. W. M. Marbut, Troy Coleman and L. D. Lyon are holdovers, and E. P. Pearson, Joe Middleton and Otis McCarty Jr., are on the election ballot for a three year term. N. H. McFaul is candidate for treasurer.

Frank Sloan is nominee for mayor at Stanfield and the names of C. M. McCall, G. G. Smith, Wm. Behme, M. Refvem, John W. Heckman and J. F. Lane are on the ballot for city councilmen. Recorder and treasurer are appointive offices at Stanfield.

J. C. Tucker and Pearl Jarvis are candidates for the office of mayor at Umatilla, E. McKenzie for recorder, and J. A. Springer for treasurer. Eight names appear on the ballot for councilmen of which six will be elected. They are L. Brownell, Geo. E. Butterwood, J. W. Connell, H. B. Hull, Thos. Slattery, W. H. Switzer and Roscoe F. Williams.

F. C. McKenzie, will be the only name on the ballot for mayor of Hermiston, and likewise Chas. Taylor for recorder, and Mrs. Gertrude Sanders for treasurer. For councilmen, nine names will appear on the ballot, from which six will be selected. These are W. W. Felthouse, N. R. Mueller, Dr. W. L. Morgan, B. Hanelline, M. L. Watson, R. A. Brownson, M. G. Hedwall, Al Quiring and George Harkenrider.

SWIFT INSTALLS SEMI-SCALD PLANT AT STANFIELD

Swift & Company is opening a semi-scald turkey dressing plant at Stanfield under the management of Geo. Morton. In the building formerly constructed by the Apple association of Stanfield. The building is 40x80 feet, built of hollow tile and located parallel with the railroad track west of the depot.

Equipment for semi-scald is being installed in the building, and it is expected will be ready for use by November 6. The plant will employ from 25 to 35 people during the picking season.

Swift & Company calls for and delivers the birds to the plant, scalds and dresses them and pays the grower on a dressed basis, Mr. Morton says.

LARGEST CHECK FOR SINGLE CASH CROP

The largest check for a single crop grown on the Umatilla Irrigation Project is probably the one received a few days ago by L. W. Dixon for 12 tons of hops produced on 15 acres. The check was for \$8500. Besides this check he still has as part of the crop on the 15 acres, one and one-half tons, which he values at \$680 per ton. Under the hop control marketing board Dixon was not allowed to harvest two and a half acres of his total yard of 17 and one-half acres.

He grew the hops and cured them on his home place, and sold the output to the Olympic Brewing company. The Dixon hops are seedless and are used to blend with other hops in the brewing of Olympia beer which creates a sweeter product.

PROPER TURKEY GRADING METHODS AT DEMONSTRATION

LOCAL GROWERS ASSIST SPECIALIST

Proper methods of grading and killing turkeys was demonstrated before 150 local turkey growers at the Umatilla Project fair grounds Monday afternoon, October 31. N. L. Bennion, poultry specialist from Oregon State college, explained the changes in the U. S. turkey grading laws, which will become effective for the first time this year.

Mr. Bennion urged all growers to get birds on the market as soon as possible after they are ready. He explained that the pounds of feed required to produce one pound of gain in weight gradually increases from approximately one-half pound the first month to five and one-half pounds the sixth month. After the sixth month, the number of pounds required to produce a pound of gain increases practically 100 per cent. In other words, it takes approximately 5.66 pounds of feed to finish a bird at six months. During the seventh month it will take practically ten pounds gain to get 1.9 pound gain.

Mr. Bennion discussed briefly the importance of selecting early maturing birds for breeding stock. He brought out that one of the first problems of the grower in handling breeding stock is to supply them with a ration which contains the proper vitamins, emphasis being placed on vitamins A, D and G. He stated that there was little danger of getting the breeding stock too fat under methods used here as the birds are selected rather young and need a supply of feed for growing and production.

The vitamin A content can be supplied with green feeds, yellow corn, and an adequate supply of cod liver oil. Where U. S. P. oil is used, two percent should be added to the ration. In the concentrated form add 12 pounds to the ton of feed. If sufficient cod liver oil is added, it will take care of the vitamin D requirements. Vitamin G is supplied by milk and milk by-products fed in the liquid or dry form.

If the proper amount of mash and scratch is kept before the birds at all times, the fertility and hatchability of the eggs will be increased. Mr. Bennion suggests that the mash be placed before the breeding stock six weeks before they come into lay. This will mean that the birds should be receiving mash not later than February 1.

Mr. Bennion also stated that a good rule to follow in feeding breeding hens is to see that from 60 to 65 percent is made up of scratch and from 30 to 40 percent mash. A supply of green feed should be kept before the birds at all times. He also indicated that egg production may be stimulated through the use of artificial light. Electricity is now available in the rural districts of this area through the REA, for the first time this year.

Logan Todd, local turkey grower, assisted Mr. Bennion by demonstrating the proper methods of killing and picking a bird. He also removed wing tip feathers, which is one of the new requirements this year. Mr. Todd also discussed methods of handling birds from the time they are killed until they reach the warehouse.

DEXTER HEADS JUNIOR DRUM CORPS

Robert Dexter, son of Mrs. W. B. Dexter of Umatilla, who is teaching in the schools at Clatskanie, Ore., took his Junior American Legion Drum Corps to the national convention at Los Angeles, and there they received honorable mention. Officials of the American Legion in Portland wrote letters of congratulation to the members and their director for the splendid performance given at the national convocation.

Dexter is a graduate of the Irrigon high school and was active in band work and other school affairs.
