Tuesday is election day. The candidates for office have been talking, advertising, visiting voters and each trying to make his case as strong as possible to convince the electorate that he should be chosen for the office he seeks. This is our democratic system. It is our way of choosing paid servants in county, state and national affairs. Tuesday will be the day for the voice of the people to speak in judgment. The only way to use this judgment of men and issues is to mark a ballot. It is the only way to support a democracy, which is your democracy, and not the dictatorial system of Mussolini, Hitler and Stalin. The citizen who fails to vote may unwittingly contribute to forces from without which may undermine our system. Your right to make that "x" is just as great as that of the highest official in the nation, and just as effective in the count. You should be proud that every campaign brings to you the right and privilege of passing judgment on the acts of administrative officials, when you can sustain or disapprove by the simple method of going to the polls and marking a secret ballot. Nothing is so great, or powerful, or changeful, or wise or foolish, in this America of ours,

which you as a private citizen, however humble, have not the final right to approve or reject in the interest of your own welfare, and that of your family, your country, state and nation. Do not allow weather, business and above all, mere negligence, keep you from the polls next Tuesday.

TOWNSEND PLAN QUESTIONS ASKED

Tom Bradstreet, national representative for the Townsend Plan in Nebraska, writing from his home in Grand Island, asks a few pointed questions in an editorial published by Harry L. Bras in the Centra, Wash., Chronicle. Mr. Bradstreet's remarks follow:

"Today are we satisfied with conditions? When the farmers have a lower market for their grain; with millions of bushels being imported; millions of pounds of meat imported; American factories idle, unemployment rampant; millions of people on the dole; billions of dollars spent to check crime; thousands of homes and farms sold every month for mortgages and taxes; more and more taxes on top of the burden you are now carrying, and, when there are no more tax dollars to tax, then what?"

"Would you be willing to help one and one-half billions of dollars in the channels of trade every 30 days, without bonding our national government? Would you like to see the American dollar spent in America for American goods, manufactured in America by American labor? Would you care to have 11 million young people return to work in our stores and factories? Would you care for an American market for American goods and farm products? Are you satisfied with 60 per cent of each dollar being spent for relief, with no relief for the taxpayer? Two per cent transactions tax will do more than this. In time it will pay the national debt and banish depression for all time. Sixty-five billion dollars in non-taxable government bonds cannot be taxed on the bond, but can be taxed on the transaction of the bond. If everything is rosy, tear this up and forget your downtrodden neighbor and 11 million unemployed and 70 million undernourished.

"Thirteen states of our Union have a law denying those who receive assistance the right to vote at county, state, or national elections. Are you satisfied? "Thank you!"


