I. E. W. A. ELECTS AT ANNUAL MEETS

The Inland Empire Waterways association held its annual meeting at Lewiston, Idaho, October 25. The association went on record pledging its efforts and support of Document 704, which was presented to congress last June 3, by the board of army engineers, and the war department, recommending the full development of the Columbia and Snake rivers, with the first dam at Umatilla rapids to be followed by four dams on the Snake. The association will devote its efforts to secure a favorable action on the measure supporting the engineer's report, to be introduced in congress by Senator Schwellenback in January, when it is expected that funds will be released to begin construction at Umatilla rapids.

Officers elected at Lewiston are as follows: J. W. Shepherd of Lewiston, vice president for Idaho; Lardu Barnum of The Dalles, vice president for Oregon; Jay Perry of Kennewick, vice president for Washington; and nine directors, Judge C. L. Sweek of Pendleton; Bert Johnson of Ione; F. V. Galloway of The Dalles; J. B. McDonald of Grangeville; Allen D. Newman of Culdesac; R. S. Erb of Lewiston; Arthur E. Cox of Walla Walla; B. M. Huntington of Walla Walla, and Charles Baker of Walla Walla.

Executive secretary H. G. West reported that the association had collected from eleven counties in Washington and seven counties in Oregon and from the State of Idaho, the sum of \$11,006.39, and had on hand the sum of \$1247.90. Quotas allotted to the same territory for the ensuing year were set at a total of \$13,450, which is to be used in the campaign to secure favorable action from congress. The quota assigned Umatilla county, \$1750, and Morrow county, \$500.

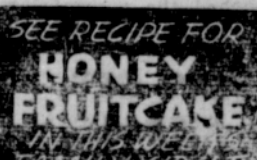
